Festival Of Trees Committee Announces People's Choice Winners

For the ninth straight year, Southwest Floridians flocked to the Fort Myers River District to visit Goodwill Industries' annual Festival of Trees. More than 2,000 ballots were cast in the festival's People's Choice Awards, in which visitors can vote for their favorite trees. The festival is Goodwill's largest fundraiser of the year.

"The competition for the People's Choice Awards has become a big part of the festival," said Goodwill spokesperson Madison Mitchell. "Everyone always has a hard time picking their favorites. The tree designers definitely get into some friendly competition over it, too."

Most coveted is the Best All-Around Award, which this year was presented to long-time festival participant Univision, for its Magic of the Nutcracker tree. The nine-foot tree was decorated with nutcrackers, red ribbons and gold tone orna ments. The tree also came with a full page ad in *D'Latinos* Magazine, a 49-inch LG Ultra 4K HDTV, Dinner at Komoon Thai Sushi & Ceviche, and 10 Univision VIP box tickets for Florida Everblades vs. Brampton at Germain Arena. The overall value was \$3,600.

The tree designed by the Sidney & Berne Davis Art Center was also a crowd favorite at the festival. The tree, titled Holiday Spirit, won the Most Creative ribbon from festivalgoers and came with approximately 118 bottles of wine on a custom-made treestyle wine rack. The tree was also accompanied by a fivecourse dinner and wine for 10 at the home of Fran Fenning,

catered by G3 Catering. The overall value of the tree was \$5,000. The win puts them as the only tree designer who has won every category of the People's Choice at the festival.

Winner of the Most Traditional Award was The Home Depot's Let's Do This: Let Home Depot Tools Help tree. The nine-foot tree was decorated in shades of red and gold, and was accompanied by a giant rolling stand-up tool chest, assorted power tools and accessories, and \$300 in The Home Depot gift cards. The total value of the tree was \$1,500.

Mayor's Choice – for the second year in a row – went to CenturyLink. Its Joy To The World seven-foot tree was decorated in a travel theme, complete with a globe-style tree-topper. The tree was accompanied by a five-piece Open Seas by Nautica luggage set, and a 22-inch Italian-style globe bar with wine and glasses, wrapped in replica 16th century nautical maps from the National Museum of Science. The tree was valued at \$2,000.

"I picked this beautiful tree because I'm inspired by the message it sends," said Fort Myers Mayor Randy Henderson of CenturyLink's design, "It talks about joy for the continued on page 18

THE RIVER - DECEMBER 25, 2015 Historic Downtown Fort Myers, Then And Now: Santa's Downtown Mailbox

his photo pictures Jesse Winford "Win" Ellis at a downtown bank during the month of November in the 1950s. (The location is not identified, but the distinctive tile work and time period suggest that the setting might be the Lee County Bank at Main and Hendry.)

Note the choice of four holiday envelopes on display, as well as the message printed on the side of the "Santa Claus

mailbox": "Letters mailed here will be post-marked with the famous Santa Claus, Indiana, postmark."

Since 1914, the post office in the small town of Santa Claus, Indiana, has carried on a Christmas tradition that delights chil-dren around the world. Volunteers, officially called Santa's elves, personally answer the thousands of letters addressed to Santa. Each reply is handwritten in red ink and bears the famed post-mark seen in the photo: "Santa Claus, Ind." The post office receives the most letters to Santa right after

Thanksgiving - maybe that's when participating businesses set out their posters and collection boxes like the ones pictured here in November.

The Indiana "elves" send replies from December 1 until around Christmas Eve, thus guaranteeing that each postmark carries a December date.

Since no annotations accompany the historic photo, it's impossible to say whether Ellis was involved in collecting the letters to Santa or whether the setting was simply convenient for a Christmastime photo opportunity, but the formality of the photo and the November date suggest that the photo served as an announcement that the special post office had been set up downtown and awaited letters to Santa.

Given Ellis's record of giving back to the community, it wouldn't be surprising if he were acting as one of Santa's postmen.

In 1949, Ellis opened the Snack House, one of the most popular restaurants Fort Myers ever had. He was brought to town by Barron G. Collier, who wanted someone to run a restaurant in the Collier Arcade (also known as the Post Office Arcade) on Broadway. At that time, Collier owned a bus line that had a terminal in the arcade, which until the early 1990s, also had a wing opening onto First Street.

Ellis would run the Snack House for 44 years. Locals remember it as a veritable institution with a home-away-from-home atmosphere, where downtown's business really took place over comfort food.

Ellis was devoted to Fort Myers and was active in many community organizations and efforts. He was president of Fort Myers Chamber of Commerce and the Southwest Florida Restaurant Association. He served on the committee that recruited the Pittsburgh Pirates to hold spring training in Fort Myers during the 1950s and was active in the Lions Club, Shriners, Masonic Order and Salvation Army.

heatre Conspiracy will present the Florida Premiere of Kayak by Canadian playwright Jordan Hall at the The Alliance for the Arts in Fort Myers. The production will

be directed by Stephen Hooper and will

open on January 7. Winner of the 2010 Samuel French Canadian Playwrights Contest, Kayak begins with Annie Iversen alone on a vast stretch of water. She recounts the strange chain of events that left her stranded in her son's old kayak.

A doting suburban mother, Annie is blindsided when her son Peter falls in love with Julie, a passionate environmental activist. Unable to reconcile herself to Julie's radical worldview, Annie struggles desperately to keep Peter from falling further into the young woman's dangerous world.

Climate change, S'mores, SUVs, and Noah's Ark are all onstage as

Annie sets out to save her son, and unwittingly throws herself into the path of events larger than she ever could have imagined.

Touching and provocative, Kayak looks at our world in a new light. This show is sponsored by Bruce and Janet Bunch.

Later next month, Theatre Conspiracy will also present the Florida premiere of The Amish Project, a solo play by award-winning writer Jessica Dickey at Florida SouthWestern State College's Black Box Theatre in Building L. At a time when mass shootings happen almost daily in our country, the events surrounding the Nickel Mines killings stand out in our memories - not only because most Americans

could never comprehend such a thing happening among the pacifist Amish, but because the Amish families of the victims extended forgiveness to the shooter and condolences to the shooter's family.

Called "a remarkable piece of writing" by The New York Times and "unique, uplifting, and unforgettable" by Chicago Theatre Beat, this powerful and poetic piece is a fictional exploration inspired by the 2006 killing of five girls in a hostage-taking at an Amish school in Pennsylvania. One actress (Tera Nicole Miller) conjures seven characters, from gunman to community members, to victims and family, and delves into how communities are indelibly tied together in such a crisis, as well as how forgiveness and compassion are forged in the wake of tragedy.

The Amish Project plays January 22, 23, 28, 29 and 30 and February 4, 5 and 6 at 8 p.m. There will be one matinee on February 7 at 2 p.m. Opening night on January 22 is "pay what you will." Thursday nights are "buy one get one half off". Tickets are \$24 or \$11 for students with proper ID and women under 41 years of age.



Rotary District Fights Polio

Robustrict 6960 District Governor Cyndi Doragh has announced that the World's Greatest Meal, part of a global movement to support Rotary International's campaign to End Polio Now, raised a record amount of more than \$150,000. The event was held on Monday, November 16 at the Westin Resort in Cape Coral and featured guest speaker Susanne Rea.

A polio survivor Susanne Rea, past president of the Rotary Club of Cairns Sunrise in Queensland, Australia, dreamed up The World's Greatest Meal, where clubs and individuals can hold their own meal events and donate the proceeds to PolioPlus, the 30-year-old Rotary program that has raised hundreds of millions of dollars to eradicate polio. Having promoted the concept across far-flung destinations in India, Rea has embarked on an eight-country tour, including district conferences in the United States such as Southwest Florida's District 6960 Rotary Club Conference this past May at South Seas Resort on Captiva.

In her world travels, Rea has witnessed the creative concepts that have come out of her call to action, from a simple gathering of Rotary members over coffee to an auction of Pele soccer memorabilia in Brazil. In 2014 Rotary members raised

enough money through the World's Greatest Meal to vaccinate four million children against polio. Through 2018 every dollar Rotary commits to polio eradication will become three dollars, thanks to a 2-to-1 match from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

Doragh said, "Susanne's project has highlighted the impact one person can have to further invigorate an initiative that is already deeply ingrained in the culture of Rotary. 



Cool Down Did Not Slow The Action

This week marks the official start of winter, although after we experienced a few cold mornings over the weekend the sun quickly came back out and our

temperatures rebounded. During the cooler, windy days fishing was a little tougher as expected but even during the worst conditions to fish we still managed to catch a great mixed bag including the first sheepshead of winter on my boat.

The 10-degree plus drop in water temperatures after the cold front had the fish hiding out in the deep warm water mangrove creeks and channels. Once tucked away in these creeks and out of the windy rough open water, anglers were greeted by gin clear water and a very consistent bite. Chunks of shrimp fished on a jig head caught lots of sheepshead, snapper and even a few rat redfish. For non-stop action the shrimp chunks where hard to beat.

My go-to, catch-all shrimp jig rig for winter consists of a white $\frac{1}{4}$ oz. jig head with a 2/0 hook. When the bite is slow or the water cold, pinch the tail off a live shrimp and thread the hook up inside the bait then pinch off the head. Threading a shrimp chunk on a jig head like this not only gives the bait a smaller profile, puts out scent but also makes it hard for small- mouthed fish to steal it. The weighted jig head keeps the bait down against the bottom, slowing down the drift in a moving tide. Fish this rig as slow as possible, just lifting the rod tip now and again to make sure it's not stuck on the bottom. Even during the toughest fishing conditions this rig will get bit when nothing else will.

As the days warmed I switched up the baits to live shiners and with a little help from live chumming had snook and snapper busting baits in the creeks right



on the surface. Sheltered, sun-warmed bays in these same creeks systems fished with shrimp and shiners under





a popping cork were all loaded up with trout of all sizes. Finding clear water to catch these trout has been the key, even during windy periods. If you can find somewhere sheltered and out of the wind the water will be clear and the perfect set-up for trout fishing

As our waters have only gradually cooled down we are lucky enough to still have great fishing action on many of the premiere species we usually only associate with the warmer months. While you're visiting or have family in town for the holidays, take a break, get away from the crowds and spend some quality time making memories out on the water.

American Bittern

The American bittern (Botaurus lentiginosus) is a solitary, heronlike wading bird that stalks it prey (such as fish, frogs, meadow voles and giant water bugs) by standing motionless

in patches of tall marsh vegetation with its neck outstretched and bill pointed skyward. Its stand-and-wait hunting method is successful due to its perfectly camouflaging plumage: rich browns punctuated by black flecking, vertical tan streaks, black throat patches, and white stripes that go from the underside of its throat down to its belly. Its muted-yellow bill, thin (but short) legs of yellow-green and rusty-brown crown complete its disguise. It is such an expert at blending in that – if it spots, for example, a birdwatcher nearby – the bittern may slowly sway from side to side, imitating reeds gently swaying in the wind.

Despite being fairly numerous during breeding season around freshwater marshes, these secretive birds are difficult to spot. Their calls, however – particularly those of the males – are very distinctive and easily heard, even from lengthy distances. In order to communicate with one another through thick vegetation, bitterns use low-frequency calls that carry farther than high-pitched ones. The calls of the males during mating season have been described as bizarre – the resonant *pumper-lunk*, the hoarse *kok-kok-kok* or the continual *chu-peep*. These characteristic sounds have earned the American bittern several nicknames: stake-driver, waterbelcher, thunder-pumper and mire-drum.

In early December, an adult American bittern was admitted to CROW as patient #15-3431. After a thorough physical exam, the bird was anesthetized to allow for radiographs. The bittern had suffered severe trauma, likely from a car collision, that resulted in numerous broken bones. While the bird was unconscious, its right leg was set and wrapped and its right wing was placed in a sling. Before being moved to a quiet room in the clinic's ICU for some much needed rest, subcutaneous (under the skin) fluids, an antiinflammatory and a pain medication were administered.

Dr. Molly Lien, DVM intern, workedup a schedule for the patient's continued care that included a species-specific diet, daily fluid injections, pain medication, an anti-inflammatory and tub time sessions.

After a week at the wildlife hospital, the bittern appeared to be more bright and alert, and had even gained a small amount of weight. While slow but steady improvement was noted, its recovery was not without a minor issue.

Railroad vine (Ipomoea pes-caprae) is an evergreen perennial and one of a dozen morning glories native to Florida. It is also called goat's-foot vine, beach morning glory and bayhops. In the wild, this mat-forming vine is

In the wild, this mat-forming vine is found on beaches and on sand dunes above the water line. Its seeds are dispersed by wind and water, and wherever it takes root, it helps to prevent beach erosion.

It has high salt tolerance and has evolved to withstand wind, salt spray, heat, and brackish water. Therefore it's an excellent choice for coastal landscapes.

If you need a groundcover for a sunny, dry, or sandy spot, this vine might be the answer. It also can be trained to cover a fence or trellis.

A fast grower, it sends out succulent stolons, or runners, which creep along the soil, rooting at the nodes and binding sand together. The word *Ipomoea*, which means worm-like, refers to this habit.

The plant grows to be about one and one-half feet high and can be as long as 100 feet.

Starchy taproots extend deeply into the soil – three feet or more – one characteristic that makes it so drought tolerant.

The thick, two-lobed leaves of two to four inches long have a shallowly notched apex and a leaf stem of about six inches. Rounded or oblong, they are folded along the midvein.

That notch gives them a shape resembling a goat's footprint and the

term pes-caprae means "goat's foot." They also resemble the leaves of the non-native Hong Kong orchid tree.

The rosy pink or purple flowers are about two to three inches wide with five fused petals that form a trumpetshaped corolla. The flower's interior has a lovely star-shaped pattern formed by stripes radiating from the throat, which is darker than the rest of the flower.

Flowers bloom all year, lasting only

a day, peaking in spring and summer. They are a food source for caterpillars, beetles, and grasshoppers.

Railroad vine also provides habitat for several native species and attracts a variety of pollinators.

It will tolerate a variety of soils, including nutrient-poor soil, but will not tolerate over-watering.

The small, round, hard, leathery fruit contains four seeds.

Propagate this vine with cuttings or scarified seeds

The vines and roots are edible, but only in very small quantities.

Medicinal uses include the treatment of jellyfish stings with the milky juice in the leaves. It is also used to treat fatigue, arthritis, rheumatism, and as a diuretic. And, it is traditionally used in spiritual practices in some cultures.





With 45 College Football Bowl Games, Has System Gone Berserk?

Is the system broken, ridiculous or just plain money-hungry? The system I'm discussing is the current runaway lineup of 45 – count 'em – 45 college football bowl games that will saturate television from December 19 to January 11. By the time you read this week's paper, 13 already will have been played. A good trivia game around the holiday dinner table this weekend would be a contest to see how many of the bowls you can even name.

If you love college football, then you're probably in heaven for the next few weeks despite the fact that many of the bowl games will be played in cold weather sites before seas of empty seats.

And some of the participating teams didn't even post regular-season winning records, yet received bowl invitations. Nebraska, Minnesota and San Jose State are 5-7 teams reaching post-season play.

I note that one of these sub-500 teams, San Jose State, won the Cure Bowl (whatever that means) last Saturday with a 27-16 victory over 6-6 George State.

The Rose Bowl, known as the "Granddaddy" of bowl games, was first held in 1902. By 1937, there were six college bowl games. Two years ago the count had leaped to 35, and this year 45, including the Shrine East-West, NFLPA Collegiate and the Senior Bowl.

Let's be honest: We have such a plethora of bowl games for one principal reason – money.

Amendment Decision On River Hall Declared Noncompliant

The Conservancy of Southwest Florida recently participated in proceedings regarding the adopted Lee County Plan amendment decision for River Hall and the concern over "overriding public necessity."

Administrative Law Judge Suzanne Van Wyk has ruled that a Lee County plan amendment should not have been approved by Lee County. Judge Van Wyk determined that the adopted amendment is contrary to the Caloosahatchee Shores Community Plan because no finding of "overriding public necessity" was made to support removing the land from the rural lands category. This ruling sets an important standard for Lee County development that will protect rural communities from being demolished, according to a Conservancy spokeswoman.

Ralf Brookes, attorney for the petitioners, said, "This is an important recommended order that sets a precedent that supports community plans in Lee County with similar language."

Expert planning opinion testimony was presented by Julianne Thomas, senior growth management specialist at the Conservancy, who said, "Comprehensive plans are meant to be a vision for how the citizens in a community want to grow. In Lee County, community plans are created by citizen planning efforts. Those community plans are important, and this order gives legal significance to their plans and vision for the future."

The Caloosahatchee Shores community plan is the result of a community planning effort and was adopted as part of the Lee County comprehensive plan.

The plan amendment, approved by a 4-1 vote on June 3, 2015 as Ordinance 15-10, would have increased density on 585 acres in the River Hall development located in the Caloosahatchee Shores Planning Area by changing the land use designation from the rural land category to the sub-outlying suburban land category.

This change would have effectively doubled the allowable density from one unit per acre in the rural land category to two units per acre in the sub-outlying suburban land category in the 585-acre amendment area.

The community plan specifically requires that at least three members of the Board of County Commissioners make a finding of overriding public necessity in order to remove land from the rural land category in the Caloosahatchee Shores Planning Area.

In this case, 585 acres of land was removed from the rural land category without the required finding of "overriding public necessity."

Lee County residents of River Hall as well as other Lee County residents from other Lee communities with similar language in their community plans, challenged the legality of this amendment, and requested a formal administrative hearing.

After conducting a day-long evidentiary hearing on October 12, 2015 the judge concluded that the amendment was "not in compliance" with Florida's Community Planning Act because it was inconsistent with the plain language contained in the Caloosahatchee Shores community plan.

Judge Van Wyk agreed with the residents, entering a recommend order in their favor and against Lee County and the developers of the proposed project.

Football revenue is the bulwark for college minor sports. And studies have shown that schools that win major bowl games are recipients of increased alumni financial support.

But you've got to wonder how far this bowl game business will go? At the rate it has grown, the day may come that every college with a football team will play in a bowl game regardless of their records.

While we may question the wisdom of having all these bowl games, ratings show that the games do attract large viewing audiences, Maybe that's the reason ESPN actually owns and operates 12 of the bowls.

The Big 10 sent 10 of its 14 members in bowl games, including Michigan State as one of the four teams playing for the national championship. Iowa, which lost to Michigan State in the Big 10 Championship game, faces Stanford in the revenue-rich Rose Bowl on January 1.

A report this week showed that the average resale price for a Rose Bowl ticket has reached \$705, the highest by far of any bowl game, including the two semi-final national championship games.

Interestingly, Jim Delany, Big Ten commissioner, explained that Iowa will not reap the entire Rose Bowl money bonanza. The revenue will be divided between all 14 conference members.

meet this goal, a wonderful organization called Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) has a unique gift for you and your children.

Recently, science is showing that brains continue to develop even beyond middle age. This is great news. The previous viewpoint maintained that the brain lost cells and the capacity to rewire itself with age. Now it appears the brain cells aren't really vanishing. Instead, they become somewhat hidden away in the folds of the neurons.

As folks age, many notice a difficulty in retrieving memories. Why does this occur? The neural connections that process information weaken with disuse and with age. The memories are there, they just need something to prod them to emerge or jump-start them back to recall. How do we keep these brain connections in good condition? We actually have to challenge our synapses by thinking in different ways. Learning new things is a great place to start, but we need to make a special effort to confront the way we think. We do that by studying viewpoints that are different than our own, for example.

Joggle the brain by daring to consider a different perception. Try hanging around with people who don't think like you or reading something you don't necessarily agree with. How about taking a different route to the store, learning a different language, taking a different mode of transportation? In this way, we contend with those long established brain connections, and get out of our comfort zones and push and nourish our brain.

We all know as adults, we kind of like things a certain way. Year after year, our synapses get accustomed to doing the same thing in the same way. We need to mix it up, and tread new paths to keep our brain developing. Let's challenge our ingrained perceptions, sharpen our brains and keep those neural pathways engaged and developing.

At this time of year, while shopping for people you love, why not consider some health gadgets that improve well-being or comfort. There are plenty of items in the health

arena that I find really interesting. In no particular order, here goes:

Water bottle – Fitness fanatics unite! This is the coolest invention ever, I can put a key, my gym ID, a credit card and even some cold, hard cash in my BPAfree water bottle. Ugh, makes me mad I didn't think of it, it's called the Autoseal Kangaroo at gocontigo.com.

Waterproof MP3 player – Just in case you want to listen to music or audio books while taking a shower, swimming laps or diving the Galapagos. Look for The Diver DB-10 which includes waterproof earbuds sold on Amazon.

Personal Steam Inhaler – Great if you have sinus problems. The Mabis allows you to adjust the amount of steam and the particle size. You can add your own essential oil if desired.

Baseball cap with lights – Hunters wear these hats, but I keep one by my bed in case I have to get up in the wee hours of the morning.
