# Meet The Artists Friday Night During Art Walk

also be new works from the co-op artists. Cristina became "Dedo" the artist in his first semester at Tampa Tech in 1995 where he received a degree in graphic design. He moved on to sculpture and continued design while taking courses at the VAC, the Cultural Center and at Ringling. Working on constructions using recycled materials has become his favorite pastime, which continues today.

In 2014, he had the opportunity to create something different for couture runway shows in Naples, Fort Myers and St. Petersburg. This became the foundation for body masks, photography props and a continuing fascination with body and face casting. Dedo's current art is reverse collages

# A Psychological Thriller At Lab Theater

ow playing at Laboratory Theater of Florida is Ira Levin's *Veronica's Room*, and it's rampant with depravity and performers who excel in their character portrayals. The story is a corrupt nightmare that unravels slowly,

exploring the thin line between fantasy and reality madness and murder

and reality, madness and murder.

It's 1973 and an elderly couple (Dave Rode and Aricka Shuck), who are caretakers of an old house in Boston, talk a young couple (Steven Coe and Kate Dirrigl) into coming home with them.

They talk the young woman, Susan, into impersonating a girl named Veronica. Susan bears an uncanny resemblance to the long dead girl. They dress her in Veronica's clothes, style her hair and she excitedly rehearses her role in Veronica's

Historic Downtown Fort Myers, Then And Now:

## Gilmer & Nina Heitman House

his First Street house on the river not only has romance in its history but is also an historic-preservation success

It was built in 1908 by Gilmer McCrary Heitman, Sr. for his bride, Nina Alice Sybil Travers and is located just east of Park Avenue and next door to the Sea Chest Motel.

Heitman is often remembered as the younger brother of prominent businessman Harvie E. Heitman but is historically significant in his own right.

The brothers were partners in the Heitman Store, one of the most important early downtown businesses, and Gilmer

founded the town's first telephone company, Lee County Telephone Company, in

The brothers also partnered to build the Theatre Arcade in the mid-19-teens. Heitman was also involved in real-estate development and in insurance, served as president of the Heitman-Evans Hardware Co., and participated in many other business and civic activities.

In 1935, he bought the Franklin Arms Hotel.

Gilmer Heitman had met and fallen in love with his future bride when she was visiting Fort Myers from England. Most likely, she was visiting her brothers, who were important in the development of early Fort Myers.

After Nina returned to England, Gilmer fully realized his love for her. He built

the home pictured here and journeyed to England to propose.

They had a June 1908 wedding in Fort Myers and moved to their new home. Built in the Queen Anne architectural style, it featured a continuous verandah, a widow's walk, a turreted circular porch, bay windows, fluted columns and several fireplaces, one of white marble.

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Today, the restored house is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a wedding and special-event venue photo by Gerri Reaves

The Tampa architect used cypress and cedar woods, as well as custom-built oversized red bricks joined by experimental, non-fading white mortar.

In 1996, the Heitman House was listed on the National Register of Historic Places, but only after changing hands a number of times and enduring some neglect following the deaths of Gilmer in 1960 and Nina in 1963.

In 1963, the house was damaged by fire and remained vacant for almost three decades.

A new owner restored it, followed by other owners who respected its historical value and maintained it.

As the 21st century wave of downtown redevelopment started, there was talk of the historic structure being moved across the street.

Fortunately, it remained at the original riverside location. It is now a popular venue for weddings - so appropriate since it was a gift to honor love and marriage.

Walk down to the Gilmer and Nina Heitman house and imagine what First Street was like when the couple wed and took up residence there in 1908.

Then visit the two following research centers to learn more about historic homes and who lived in them.

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# Photography Exhibit Celebrates Community

The René Miville Gallery will present a new series of photographer Kinfay Moroti's work during Art Walk on Friday, November 3. The show, titled YOU, captures the joy of community and the spirit of Southwest Florida's people. Each of Moroti's images tells a story of the intrinsic beauty that lays in the struggles of life. Without judging, Moroti's art serves as a mirror reflecting the sparks of the moment back to the observer.

Born to a prostitute in Chicago, Moroti grew up in the city's most violent housing projects and eight foster homes. His earliest goal in life was to escape the poverty, the loneliness and the sexual and physical abuse. His first attempts to break free were daily treks to the city library. There, young Moroti encountered painters Vermeer and Frida Kahlo. "I would imagine that I painted their works," he remembers. "And, as I couldn't afford painting supplies, I painted in my mind."

Since Moroti has been a resident of Southwest Florida for many years, his work reflects events in this area. For the devoted photographer, capturing moving moments in people's lives is both joyous and painful. Joyous, because Moroti feels honored to share the love that fills the communities, and painful, because these moments are becoming rare. Loneliness and melancholy feed Moroti's creative drive; they are his closest and truest companions. His works are visual attempts to understand these

ever-present feelings. "Making pictures is like cutting your veins," he said.

Moroti has worked for *The News-Press* since 2005 and has established himself as a passionate story teller through moment-driven pictures and videos. His work was also published in *Time Magazine*, *The New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *People Magazine*, *Sports Illustrated* and other national media.

the Smithsonian Spark!Lab exhibit and the Timeline of Innovation. Lee County residents will receive \$5 off admission with valid photo identification.



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### Fort Myers Art:

# City Tree Intérpreted in Group Art Show

uring the real estate boom of the 1920s, nurseryman James E. Hendry proposed that Fort Myers be nicknamed the "City of Palms." It became the town's official slogan. From November 3 to 21, that nickname will

be an exhibition at the Sidney and Berne Davis Art Center in which Lawrence Massing, Sandra Yeyati, Roy Rodriguez and Dennis Church interpret the slogan through their unique visions of how the palm has shaped our Florida experiences and culture.

Each photographer has been working on the idea for more than two years and will display some 30 images from the anthologies they've accumulated so far.

Yeyati had to make a mid-course career correction. After college, she went to law school (Cornell University), passed the bar and litigated cases for five years. Then she came to her senses and established a more rewarding lifestyle as a fine art photographer. That was in 2005. Today, she creates intriguing works of art with her cameras and plays with words as the

managing editor of a publishing company and a freelance writer for publications and individual clients.

'I am mesmerized by the fractal beauty of decay and deterioration as it forms strange patterns in surprising colors and tones," said Yeyati. "Faces also fascinate me; I look to them for answers to questions about identity and the way our surroundings influence our sense of self. Many of us hide inconceivable secrets behind a simple smile. Every one of my compositions is a confession.

Rodriguez uses a variety of cameras to capture images that contain rich narrative, whether in the form of abstract

compositions formed by the random remains of beet juice on the evening's dirty dinner dishes or arresting land, sky and seascapes from such diverse local environs as Myakka River State Park, Jupiter or while waiting for the traffic light to change on a rainy afternoon.

Approaching the world around him with a subjective eye and stepping back from traditional realism, Church explores the world of what we do not see in the traditional landscape. Using color and shape, he improvises thoughtful images that are simultaneously simple and complex, challenging yet peaceful, and which ultimately offer the viewer a

satisfying view that reflects the beauty and grace so often overlooked in the mundane world around us. He calls this body of work Americcolor, and through it, Church seeks to bring order to the visual confusion all around us.

Massing has enjoyed a lifelong love affair with photography. Some of his earliest (and fondest) memories are of his dad processing film and producing photographs in a makeshift darkroom in a tiny bathroom. Competing with his dad for Best of Show, his earliest photographs chronicle his family life and vacations. But it was while stationed in amazingly beautiful locations such as Alaska and Bermuda while serving in the U.S. Coast Guard that he became prolific in photographing his experiences and surroundings. "I started to think of becoming a professional photographer, reading about and learning everything I could find on photography,' Massing recalled. He later relocated to Florida where he became affiliated with the late Robert Rauschenberg. Through Rauschenberg's Untitled Press, Massing documented and archived the iconic artist's new work, prepared large-format transparencies for reproduction, and printed both early vintage and new negatives for use in various projects, publications, and museum installations

An opening reception for City of Palms will be held at the Davis Art Center on Friday, November 3 from 6 to 10 p.m. Tom Hall is both an amateur artist

and aspiring novelist who writes art quest thrillers. He is in the final stages of completing his debut novel titled Art Detective. A former tax attorney, he lives in Estero with his fiancé and their four





# Adult Osprey

he osprey (Pandion haliaetus) is a fish-eating raptor often found near water. It used to be classified with other hawks, but now occupies a categorization by itself, although it is referred to as a sea hawk, river hawk or fish hawk around certain

The osprey is often confused for an eagle when viewed from afar.

Ospreys are actually smaller and lighter-bodied than the eagle. The bird of prey sports a white crown and throat with a distinctive dark brown stripe through its eyes like a mask. It has a sharply hooked black bill, and its body is slender carrying long, narrow wings and long legs.

One can witness ospreys perched on the Sanibel Bridge when driving or biking across the spans. Their unique chirping, whistling calls can be heard overhead as they take flight or stand on their huge stick nests, channel markers or dead trees near or over water.

Prior the early 1970s, ospreys faced serious endangerment due to the effects of DDT and pesticides. After the chemicals were banned in 1972, they have shown a strong comeback.

At CROW, an adult osprey was admitted to the clinic from Cape Coral last week. Clinic officials said the bird was found struggling in the water of a canal. Upon examination during intake, crepitus – a grating sound or sensation produced by friction between bone and cartilage or the fractured parts of a bone - was noted in the bird's right radius, indicating a possible fracture. X-rays confirmed a fracture.

On physical exam, each wing is palpated for any evidence of swelling, wounds or instability in the bones.

In this case, the site of the tissue had palpable soft tissue swelling, and the bone in that area was unstable (and) freely movable. A subtle grating sound can be heard when the two fractured bone fragments move against each other," said Dr. Robin Bast, CROW veterinary intern. "The diagnosis was confirmed with radiographs."

The patient was given fluids and pain medication and then placed in a figure 8 wrap to immobilize the wing. Dr. Bast explained the differences between the wrap utilized and a body wrap.

"Both are types of wraps used to temporarily immobilize parts of the wing to aid in healing," she said. "A body wrap is used to stabilize the entire wing, such as for humerus fractures or shoulder girdle injuries, whereas a figure 8 wrap is used to stabilize the distal wing, (for) fractures involving the radius/ulna or metacarpals. As fractures of the distal wing begin to heal, the figure 8 wrap can be changed to a body wrap to help prevent contracture of the soft tissues which, if occurs, would result in decreased range of motion."

During last weekend, the patient received a switch in wraps. Dr. Bast stated the body wrap will be on for three weeks. It is being removed every three days so physical therapy can be performed.

"Radiographs will be taken weekly to assess if the bone remains well-aligned and healing appropriately, said Dr. Bast. "If we become concerned it is not healing appropriately, then surgery may be indicated at that time. After three weeks in a body wrap, it will be removed, and the patient will remain inside the hospital for one week strict cage rest and then be moved outside to an extended care enclosure for more physical therapy and flight strength training, as muscles can atrophy from

CROW medical personnel are monitoring the situation closely.

"The patient is doing well over the weekend," Dr. Bast added. "It tolerates physical therapy sessions well and has started to eat fish on its own.

# Fishing Cold Fronts Is All **About Timing**

**7**ith the first noticeable cold front of fall forecasted to pass through midweek, the change of season is finally here. If this year is anything like past years once this

first cool down happens, we will get on a schedule of a cold front passing through every week to 10 days. Fishing around cold fronts and learning how they effect the fishing can produce some awesome action along with some slower-than-usual fishing.

Timing is everything when it comes to fishing around cold fronts. A few days before a cold front arrives, action will start to pick up. This bite really goes off giving anglers some of the most nonstop action just as the wind comes around to the south dropping the barometric pressure just before the front passes. A few hours later on the back side of a cold front, high pressure and strong north winds grind the bite to a halt. Fishing a few hours on either side of the passing of a front will make the difference between a unforgettable day on the water and a day you just want to forget.

Redfish fishing picked up some this

week with redfish of all sizes being caught all over the sound. During high tide periods, oysters bars and mangrove shorelines were the places to be while, on the lower tides, the outside edges of sandbars and deeper natural channels held the fish. Once we located these redfish, we caught several fish back to back. Many of the redfish this week where either over the 27-inch max or just under the 18-inch minimum. Finding a shoreline or oyster bar to fish where this week's strong winds helped you by being at your back was the key. Buck Key, Regla Island and Mackeever Keys in the southern sound all had redfish by them this week, although the places changed day to day depending on the wind direction and the phase of the tide.

Snook fishing was the most consistent fishing this week with lots of spots in the sound holding many, many snook. Chumming live shiners fired these fish up and, for several days, we returned to the same shorelines to catch snook after snook. While we were fishing some of these favorite snook hot spots, it often didn't take long for dolphins to find us and run us off. Once the dolphins show up and start eating snook that your releasing, it's time to move on no matter how good this bite is. These dolphins really have this free meal thing dialed in, so please do not encourage it by feeding them. It's not only bad for our snook fishery, it's against the law to feed any wild animal.

I fished with some of my regular clients Bob, Bill and Ed from Lexington Country Club one windy day this week. We had a great day catching redfish, snook and a few other species. Although

we only ended keeping one 26.5-inch redfish, we caught two more bull redfish that were over the slot, along with a few under-the-slot reds plus about 30 snook. This kind of action along with a great variety of species is what our fall fishing is all about.

# Powderpuff Lichen

owderpuff lichen (Cladina evansii) isn't exactly a plant, although it's a common species in Florida's scrub

Also called Evans reindeer moss, this large puffy lichen is pale greenish gray, brittle when dry, and soft and sponge-like when wet.

It grows on the ground in colonies and is rootless.

Reindeer mosses are so called because the structure of their filaments resembles reindeer antlers.

Although plant-like in appearance, flora such as lichens, mushrooms, and algae don't fall under the same classifications of familiar landscape plants.

Lichens are actually a symbiotic relationship between a fungus and a colony of microscopic green or blue-green algae (cyanobacteria).

That relationship, which can range from mutually beneficial, as in powderpuff's case, to parasitic, to detrimental, forms a new composite organism.

The fungus absorbs nutrients and provides structure, and the algae produces

food through photosynthesis.

Some lichens resemble tiny bushes but others look like flat felt patches on tree bark. Powderpuff lichen is used to make little trees for model train set-ups by gluing it onto sticks.

Lichens are extremely slow-growing as little as a millimeter per year – but can live thousands of years.

They occur worldwide, even in severe climates such as deserts and the Arctic. Lichens are the main food source for caribou and reindeer.

They are homes for tiny creatures and play an important role in the nutrient cucle.

The presence of healthy lichens is an indication of good air quality. They also provide substances used to make antibiotics.

Most lichens are edible, but they are not tasty and have a high acid content. But if you're ever stranded in scrub habitat, that might be a good thing to know.

ormer Fort Myers Police Department officer Glen Clasen, currently a lieutenant of the Florida Department of Financial Services, was recently honored as a recipient of the United States Attorney's Office, Southern District of Florida's Outstanding Law Enforcement Officer of the Year Award

Lt. Clasen was honored for his work on a high-profile personal injury protection (PIP) case that led to a successful 14-year mail fraud conviction in federal court.

Lt. Clasen served in the United States Navy as a search and rescue swimmer aboard the USS John F. Kennedy prior to joining the Fort Myers Police Department and the state department. He joined the state department in 2006 as a detective assigned to the Bureau of Insurance Fraud's Fort Myers Field Office. He was promoted to lead detective in 2013 and lieutenant in June 2015.

The PIP case that led to Lt. Clasen's

award involved a large-scale criminal network that spanned from Kentucky to Fort Myers. Lt. Clasen partnered with the FBI, the Internal Revenue Service and the National Insurance Crime Bureau to unravel the fraud ring that involved staged vehicle accidents, straw clinic ownership, fraudulent insurance claims, money laundering and mail fraud. Throughout the duration of the investigation, Lt. Clasen conducted hours of surveillance and secured a confidential source who provided information critical to the case.

The lieutenant contacted each of the involved insurance companies and assisted them in identifying fraudulently billed claims. The evidence gathered throughout the course of the investigation led law enforcement to the ringleader of the network, who was tried, convicted and sentenced to 14 years in federal prison last September.

The Department of Financial Services is the state of Florida's lead investigative agency for insurance and workers' compensation fraud, fire and arson investigations and the theft or misuse of state funds. # Does Market Volatility Scare You?

is almost upon us. Of course, on Halloween night, you may see a parade of monsters, demons, Transformers and other frightening individuals stopping

by your house, exercising their right to demand candy. Fortunately, their appearance will be unlikely to cause you unpleasant dreams. But some people seem to have real fears about other things – such as what may happen in the financial markets. One way to keep those fears at bay is to avoid certain impulsive moves, such as the following:

 Avoid ducking out of the market Consider this: In March 2007, the Dow Jones Industrial Average stood at about 12,275 points. Exactly two years later, in the immediate aftermath of the financial crisis, the Dow had fallen to about 6,500 - a drop of 47 percent and the Dow's lowest point in 12 years. By that time, a lot of people had gone to the investment sidelines. So, what did they miss? Depending on how long they stayed out of the market, they may have missed some, or perhaps most, of one of the longest and strongest bull markets in history, because, just eight years later, the Dow had soared to almost 21,000, a gain of 223 percent. Of course, investing does involve the risk of losing principal, and there is no guarantee the market will perform as it has in the past. However, it's fair to say that if you duck out of the market during its lower points, you might not benefit from the gains that may follow.

• Avoid chasing "hot" stocks – By the time you hear about a supposedly "hot" stock, it may already be cooling off. Also, how trustworthy is the source? Does this tip come from an unbiased, knowledgeable individual? If not, you have reason to question its value. Even more important, though, you need to ask if the hot stock is appropriate for your needs, goals and

risk tolerance. If not, it's not so hot.

- Avoid taking on too much or too little - risk. If you feel the need to push your portfolio toward the maximum possible returns, you might invest too aggressively and take on too much risk. Conversely, if you are determined to avoid any amount of loss, at any time, you might invest so conservatively that your portfolio won't grow enough to help you achieve your long-term goals. You need to strike a balance between risk and reward that is appropriate for you, and you need to make investment choices suitable for your individual risk
- Avoid owning too many of the same investments – If you own a lot of one particular financial asset and a market downturn affects that asset class strongly, your portfolio could suffer. But if you spread your investment dollars among domestic and international stocks, bonds, U.S. Treasury securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on, you may not be as susceptible to a downturn, because different types of investments often perform differently at any given time. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can help reduce the effects of market volatility, it can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

No matter what you do, you can't take all the uncertainty out of investing. But by understanding market volatility and the composition of your portfolio, you can invest with more confidence.





# Do Not Become **Alarmed**





aile Meloy's latest novel Do Not Become Alarmed follows three sets of spoiled, wealthy parents and their children as they embark on a cruise to Central America. The

American mothers, Liv and Nora, are cousins and extremely close. Camila is from Argentina. Each has a husband and two children. The three couples soon discover the fun part of their cruise is almost over. All three families sign up for a zip-line tour of the rain forest. When the van breaks down, their guide suggests a swim at a nearby beach and, soon after, all six kids

The children become unwilling accomplices in a murder cover-up while their parents, used to security and control, turn on one another and blame themselves as they wait for news. The plot unfolds with terrifying realism as the parents deal with their emotions and fears.

There are close to 20 important characters and each is clearly distinguished by some memorable trait. One of the kids has diabetes, another is a genius, and then there's a bossy sister. We also have a black Hollywood movie star and a neurotic, high-strung white



studio executive. The Latin American characters are also interesting.

The disintegration of the world the families knew, told from the perspectives of both the adults and the children, is riveting and revealing. Do Not Become Alarmed is about the protective force of innocence and the limits of parental power. Author Ann Patchett said, "This is the book that every reader longs for: smart and thrilling and impossible to put down. Read it once at breakneck speed to find out what happens next, and then read it slowly to marvel at the perfect prose and the masterwork of a plot. It is an alarmingly good novel." This is a clever and culturally savvy emotional thriller.

# School Smart

Readers. The school cafeteria is a minefield for most middle/high school kids and a major hotspot for bullying behavior. Here's a powerful story

about a couple of high school students who have faced this situation, created a solution and are now working towards positive change for themselves and their peers - finally some good news.

Blair High School senior Jake Koch-Gallup will eat lunch with most anyone, and he's made no secret of it. The 17-year-old has recently started issuing open invitations to his Silver Spring, Maryland classmates over a phone application called Sit With Us, and he's hoping the gatherings help students find new friends. Jake said he downloaded the app last year after noticing some students sitting alone in the hallways during lunch. "It made me sad, so I wanted to do something about it," he said.

With the free phone app, students can create a profile, set their location at a certain school and receive notifications about lunch meetups. As a Sit With Us ambassador, Jake organizes the gatherings; so far, he's held two of them, with the third scheduled. The first couple of lunches have drawn five to 10 students, but Jake said about 30 to 40 people have signed up for the app at his school.

Betty Samuel, also an ambassador, said her goal is to make students feel like the lunches are a safe space. She and Jake try to strike up conversations about classes or college applications to encourage other students to get to know one another, she said. Samuel said she knows what it's like to be a newcomer. The Blair High senior said she attended a private school in ninth grade and didn't have a group of friends when she arrived. The app helps break the ice because it removes the awkwardness of walking up to students and randomly asking them to lunch, Jake said. It also gives students

an element of privacy, since they can participate anonymously. The digital-era solution to organizing meetups is perfect for students who are glued to their phones anyway, Samuel added.

The school's principal, Renay Johnson, said it's not uncommon for freshmen to arrive without many friends, since Montgomery Blair draws from a number of middle schools. Many students connect with each other through after-school programs, but some find it difficult to enter a new social circle. "I think ... in a large school, you think everyone has a lot of friends, but all too often, students do feel isolated," she said. "This is a great way to connect students during their lunch period."

Jake has spread the word about the app by putting up posters, creating a Twitter account and describing it during morning announcements. He's encouraging his peers elsewhere in Montgomery County to test it out. Jake is setting up a meeting with some school board members to talk about encouraging others to join in.

Jake said he's been corresponding with the app's creator, a California teenager who created the platform after being bullied in middle school. Natalie Hampton, who designed the app, told the Los Angeles Daily News that she ate alone her entire seventh grade year. She made friends after moving to a new school, but never forgot the feeling of being excluded. "I want to use social media, which can be harmful, and use it for a change and to do something good," she told the Daily News last year just before launching her app.

The older couple returns with completely different appearances and personalities, as does the young man. Their original Irish accents are now Bostonian. They treat the young woman as if she were Veronica and accuse her of murdering her younger sister, Cissie. They also maintain that it is 1935. When the young woman refuses to give up her identity, they call in Doctor Simpson, who she recognizes as the young man she was with earlier. To reveal what happens from this point on would be too much of a "spoiler" but it is a feast of

well-acted creepiness.

The cast is solid in multiple roles. Shuck and Dirrigl are especially convincing during frightening moments and remarkable dialogue. This is a murder mystery with a twisted ending that will leave you thinking about it long after you leave the theater. Under the direction of Nykkie Rizley, the play moves smoothly and effectively around a good looking set by Michael Eyth. All the furniture is covered in white sheets as the play begins and then they are removed to show a comfortable room in keeping with the 1930s. This is the perfect thriller for Halloween, but for adults only. # Changes Aplenty In Baseball Even Before The World Series

Te thought it was an unwritten rule of Major League Baseball that major team announcements about firing managers, hiring replacements and other staff changes were to wait until the conclusion of the World Series so as not to diminish the series media coverage.

Obviously that's not the case.

The World Series began Tuesday, but just look what was announced before the first pitch:

1. The Boston Red Sox fired manager John Farrell and hired Houston Astros bench coach Alex Cora to a three-year contract. Cora has a bit of work remaining before taking the Boston job with the Astros facing the Los Angeles Dodgers in the World Series.

2. The Detroit Tigers fired manager Brad Ausmus and hired former Minnesota Twins Manager Ron Gardenhire.

3. The New York Mets bounced manager Terry Collins and hired Cleveland Indians pitching Coach Mickey Callaway.

4. The Washington Nationals fired manager Dusty Baker and are interviewing Chicago Cubs bench coach Dave Martinez and Mets batting coach Kevin Long.

We wrote last week that the dismissal of Farrell was a foregone conclusion after the Red Sox were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs for the past two years.

A former Red Sox player, the bilingual Cora is known to communicate well with

players and work well with young players.

Gardenhire, of course, is well known here having managed the Twins from 2002 to 2014. He won six American League Central Division titles during that span and was named American League Manager of the Year in 2010. He is one of only 10 managers in baseball history to win more than 1,000 games with the same team.

There could be one more managerial job open as the contract of the New York

Yankee's Joe Girardi has expired. He just completed a four-year deal worth \$16 million. However, he is expected to resign with the Yankees. Girardi has won more than 900 games during his 10-year Yankee tenure.

Of local interest, there are reports that Farrell could possibly sign on as pitching coach for the Chicago Cubs who last week fired their pitching coach, Chris Bosio.

Farrell has strong ties with Theo Epstein, the Cubs president of baseball operations, from his days when Epstein was Red Sox general manager.

At the same time, Bosio could be headed to the Twins as he and Twins manager Paul Molitor were teammates.

Baseball's "hot stove league" fired up well before the cold weather and even before the first inning of the 2017 World Series.

# Study Findings Featured At Conference

aul DiGiorgi, MD, cardiothoracic surgeon with Lee Health's Shipley Cardiothoracic Center, was a featured presenter at the 14th annual Multidisciplinary Cardiovascular and Thoracic Critical Care Conference held recently in Washington, D.C. More than 200 physicians, advanced practitioners and nurses attended the conference, which was presented by The Society of Thoracic Surgeons at the Omni Shoreham Hotel.

In his presentation, Dr. DiGiorgi shared conclusions of a year-long study of more than 1,000 heart surgery patients conducted at HealthPark Medical Center - the largest trial of cardiac surgery patients ever published on this topic. The study revealed a simple urine test administered 12 hours post-surgery can detect elevated levels of certain proteins which are early indications that a patient may be at risk for acute kidney injury (AKI). The test can benefit patients by more quickly alerting physicians to potential kidney injury thus preventing further kidney damage, which can lead to other complications, including death. Physicians benefit by having a more powerful tool to care for their patients, and hospitals benefit by providing safer and more effective care to patients

# Four Medicinal Herbs For **Breast Cancer**

ear Readers: There's no time like the present to begin the changes necessary for better breast health. The take-home message today is that you can change the way you break down estrogen in your own

body. You have direct control over it and that's important because estrogen break down is different for everyone.

Let's start with the basics. When you say the word "estrogen," that's actually three compounds: Estradiol, Estrone and Estriol. Of the three, estradiol is most strongly associated with causing cancer than the other two.

Men and women both make estrogen. It's the breakdown product from testosterone actually. If you have low testosterone, you'll have low estrogen

Your body breaks down estrogen into metabolites, and some of those are more likely to cause cancer than others. Like I said, you can change the way that your body breaks down the circulating estrogen. So right now, I'm going to give valuable information about how to manufacture your own healthy estrogen metabolites and make it such that you break it down into forms that are less likely to cause cancer. If you are currently undergoing chemotherapy, please ask your doctor if these are right for you:

Rosemary – I recommend this as a fresh herb from your grocery store. Cook with it, and make tea with it. Rosemary is a powerful antioxidant that has anti-inflammatory effects similar to a COX 2 inhibitor drug. Rosemary has anti-microbial and direct benefit for breast and prostate health. It has anti-tumor benefits. It works by helping you break down estrogen into the safer anti-cancer metabolites.

Broccoli – It's impossible to eat four pounds of broccoli every day so take the supplement called I3C or DIM. It helps to balance estrogen levels in the body, and appears to have anti-cancer effects particularly for the breast and prostate. Too much crash your thyroid levels due to the goitrogenic effect.

Flax Seed – This is kind of like plantbased estrogen (termed phytoestrogens) which kicks off dangerous estrogens from your cells. Men with prostate problems could benefit. Women with "Estrogen Dominance" hallmarked by heavy periods, breast pain, cramping and anxiety might benefit from flax seed. I recommend buying fresh flax seed and grinding it in a coffee grinder and sprinkling it on yogurt or oatmeal.

Sage – Salvia officinalis is the botanical name. Just like rosemary, sage contains a lot of "carnosic acid." This compound was shown in numerous clinical trials to exert apoptosis, which means cancer cells die off. Carnosic acid when combined with the breast cancer drug, Tamoxifen, works more effectively to slow down cancer growth. You can buy fresh sage herb and cook with it, or herbal extracts at any health food store.

There are many other alternatives that I haven't elaborated on such as vitamin D, curcumin and iodine, so if you're interested in those, come to my website and sign up for my newsletter. Please ask your physician or oncologist if these are right for you. Cooking with fresh herbs should be just fine.

### **Doctor and Dietician** Stress Eating

tress eating is a vicious cycle. People get upset or depressed, and then overeat. But afterwards, they can feel upset and depressed because they ate too much. Future overeating is predicted because of the guilt and shame that follows the overeating.

Another theory about emotional eating suggests that overeating is a way to "swallow emotions." Someone doesn't feel the freedom to express what they deem as negative emotions, and therefore alleviates these feelings by finding comfort through

Other reasons for emotional eating include childhood maladaptive behaviors, past trauma, stress, anxiety and depression, and low self-esteem. People can even become addicted to food. Interestingly, binging on sugar and high fat foods can trigger neural pathways similar

to those of drug use. Stress eating does not only affect overweight individuals, but also affects those who are underweight. Underweight individuals eat less during periods of stress, while those who are overweight eat more. So, emotional states can affect eating across the weight spectrum.

If stress eating is a problem, here are some simple ways to try to improve your mood:

1. Eat green leafy vegetables, which are significant sources of vitamins, including folate. Folate releases serotonin, a "feel good" chemical, which is also found in beans, lentils and broccoli.

2. Choose healthy foods and snacks to stabilize your blood sugar. Sugar-laden foods and drinks will cause rapid spikes in sugar levels, which can negatively affect your mood.

3. Low Vitamin D levels are linked to depression and mood disorders, so take a 15 minute daily walk in the sun for added Vitamin D and exercise.

4. Include foods high in tryptophan, like tofu, chicken, salmon and cashews. Tryptophan is an essential amino acid that plays a vital role in producing the mood and sleep regulating neurotransmitters serotonin and melatonin.

# Keep Vaccine Between You And Flu

he Florida Department of Health in Lee County encourages all Floridians to keep vaccine between you and disease by getting a flu shot ahead of the 2017 flu season. Floridians should get the flu vaccine to protect against infection and help prevent the spread of seasonal flu to others. It has never been easier, and it's never too late to get your flu shot.

"It is especially important that people at high risk of serious flu complications such as young children, pregnant women, people with certain chronic health conditions like asthma. diabetes or heart and lung disease and people age 65 and older speak with their health care provider and obtain a flu shot," stated Angela Smith, health officer for the Florida Department of Health in Lee County.

The flu vaccine is recommended

for everyone six months and older, including pregnant women. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for your body to develop protection against the flu. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends people get injectable flu shots. Nasal spray vaccine is not recommended for this flu season due to concerns regarding its effectiveness.

It is also essential to practice good hygiene by properly and frequently washing your hands to help prevent the spread of seasonal flu. Make it a habit to clean and disinfect commonly used surfaces in your home, school or office. You can take additional steps to ward off the flu by coughing or sneezing into a tissue or your elbow and avoiding touching your face.
