# Alliance Presents Animal Life Exhibit

The Alliance for the Arts January exhibit, Animal Life, will feature artists transforming paper, canvas, clay and masking tape into a rampaging herd of artistic wonder from January 12 to February 3. The show features local artists Jeff and Dale Ocasio, Lily Hatchett, Felipe Maldonado and Terry Lynn Spry.

The opening reception will be held on Friday, January 12 from 5 to 7 p.m. A conversational walk-and-talk with the exhibiting artists will be held during SoCo Second Saturday on Saturday, January 13 at 6 p.m. Admission to the gallery is free, but a \$5 suggested donation helps keep arts programming accessible.

The Ocasios, husband and wife, work collaboratively to create "ocasiocasa" artworks. Sculpting with paper masking tape over wire and reclaimed objects is where their artwork begins. Each sculpture is encased with layers of acid-free glue, color is added with more layers of acrylics and protected with matte varnish. Many of the duo's sculptures are documented through

digital illustrations and animations. Their work draws attention to the enchantment of ordinary things, creatures and nature shining a light on images provided



# A Powerful Musical Hits The Stage At Broadway Palm

American musical on Broadway, and it's showing now at Broadway Palm. I was lucky to be there opening night which is special because you can almost feel the electricity in the air. And when the show begins with those marvelous Fosse moves, we know we're in for another memorable performance. Chicago deals with murder, greed, corruption and treachery in Chicago during the 1920s, and the entire cast does an excellent job taking us through the tantalizing drama in roles ranging from law enforcers to lawbreakers.

#### THE RIVER - JANUARY 5, 2018 Historic Downtown Fort Myers, Then And Now: Bowling On Monroe by Gerri Reaves, PhD



othing in this circa-1945 photo suggests what the location looks like now.

Pictured is the east side of Monroe Street north of Main, today entirely occupied by the imposing - even alienating -- façade of the U.S. Courthouse & Federal Building.

Decades ago, the block had ordinary small businesses like the ones seen here.

That sign on the front of the building is a give-away. The large bowling-pin-shaped sign, which says (you guessed it) "bowling" marks the location of the Royal Palm Bowling Center.

It was located just a bit north of the Main Street corner.

On the north side of the bowling center in a tiny storefront is Coolidge Sign Service. One can only speculate whether Coolidge

made that distinctive sign for its neighbor.

The building that housed the concrete-block bowling alley had a history dating to the 19-teens, when it was built as a garage.

It was shaped like a fat "L", with frontage on Main (then called Oak Street) as well

as on Monroe. The Fort Myers Garage occupied the Monroe side well into the 1920s. Also located in the large building in the 19-teens was a wholesale grocery, grain and feed store. That was a particularly convenient location, for the railroad ran down Monroe and the freight depot was across the street.


In addition, the store was connected to a restaurant and a grocery that opened onto Oak.

At the northeast corner was a square corner lot carved by the L-shape. Over the years, a restaurant and then a gas station were located there.

The presence of bowling lanes downtown reflects the sport's increasing popularity in the 20th century. In fact, in 1947, President Harry S. Truman officially opened the first bowling alley in the White House.

By mid-20th century, commercial bowling lanes were sprouting up across the country

In Fort Myers, bowling alleys, or bowling greens, go all the way back to U.S. Army

Fort Myers, the second fort to be built on the site.

The state-of-the-art fort, which lay in the footprint of today's Historic River District, was constructed in the 1850s during the Third (and last) Seminole War and had a large bowling green.

Another early bowling alley in town was the one in the Elks clubhouse on the river, built in 1925 on First Street between Evans and Avalon.

By the 1950s and 1960s, however, modern sleek family-centered bowling alleys with automated pin-setters and ball returns were prevalent.

But the bowling center on Monroe was nothing fancy.

It was an eight-lane alley with human pinsetters.

As a boy, the late Pete Bowen sometimes set pins and returned the bowling balls along the tracks. He, his brother Mike and their friends would drop by the center to see if their work was needed in the afternoon or evening. They worked for tips.

There was a certain risk to the work that wouldn't pass today's labor laws. Bowen recalled that occasionally a bowler complained about the boys' pin placement by rolling a ball at the setter.

Bowen excused the "complaints," which he said were done in fun, not maliciousness. "But it was at our expense," he said.

The bowling building later became part of the printing complex of the The News-Press

Walk down to Monroe Street and imagine a small bowling alley and sign shop where federal court cases are now tried. Then visit the following research centers to learn

about downtown diversions in times gone by. The Southwest Florida Historical Society is an all-volunteer, non-profit organization open Wednesday and Saturday between 9 a.m. and noon and Wednesday 4 to 7 p.m.

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# Photographer's Work At FSW

Florida Southwestern State College will present Jerry Uelsmann: Imagemaker – a broad survey of more than 75 original photographs including never-before-seen work – opening with an artist's lecture and reception in the Bob Rauschenberg Gallery on Thursday, January 11 at 6 p.m.

One of the most celebrated photographers of his generation, Uelsmann's work has been the subject of major monographs and exhibited in more than 100 solo shows in the U.S. and abroad over the past five decades.

While Bob Rauschenberg famously focused on working in the "gap" between art and life, Uelsmann claims to work "out of himself" and often at "an almost precognitive level" while having "gradually confused photography and life." He employed as many as a dozen negatives and multiple enlargers to create a single photograph through complex and laborious darkroom techniques that he pioneered in the 1950s and '60s. He is internationally renowned as the (pre-digital) master of composite imagery and photomontage. "The goal of the artist," said Uelsmann, "is not to resolve life's mysteries, but to deepen them."

Uelsmann's photographs are in the permanent collections of the most prestigious museums worldwide, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Museum of Modern Art in New York, the Chicago Art Institute, the International Museum of Photography at the George Eastman



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#### Fort Myers Art: Brave Enough To Be Interviewed By Improvisors?

Theatre Conspiracy at the Alliance for the Arts will be presenting a limited run of Your Love, Our Musical by Rebecca Vigil and Evan Kaufman. Performances will be held Thursday,

January 11 through Sunday, January 14.

The premise for the show is as unusual as it is fraught with the potential for disaster. Self-described comedic musical improvisers, Vigil and Kaufman choose an unassuming couple from the audience and then interview them about how they met, fell in love, etc. Then they use their story to spin a hysterical impromptu musical that combines their own unique artistic chemistry (they're not a real life couple) along with that of their subjects.

"The premise sounds nearly impossible, but the execution is reliably brilliant," said *The New York Times*.

"Perhaps it could even warm the heart of the most jaded millennial," muses Bedford & Bowery.

The format of a musical is a narrative, generally," Vigil told *The*

Village Voice about the bones of the show. "Introduction of the characters, introduction of the conflict, climax of the conflict, resolution. The things we take from musical theater as a genre are the campy nature of musicals, but we do it in a self-aware, tongue-in-cheek tone. We try to make the music a little more funky and soulful than the traditional Broadway ballads. We [also] find it very important to have sincere moments to really celebrate and illustrate that this couple is in love."

Vigil actually developed the format several years before meeting Kaufman. Their own professional partnership is an interesting as the love stories they photo courtesy www.artswfl.com discover as the stories they hear from the couples they bring on stage. They met in New York City under circumstances as an unlikely as prophetic. Rebecca moved to NYC in 2009 after winning \$100,000 on the Don't Forget The Lyrics game show. A few years later, Vigil caught Kaufman performing at Asylum Improv on a trip to Boston, and she approached him about doing Your Love, Our Musical when he too moved to New York several months later.

The rest is, as the saying goes, history. The show quickly became *New York Times* and *Time Out New York* critics' picks. The interactive show was subsequently accepted into the 2015 New York City International Fringe Festival, where it won Best Acting. In 2017, the





#### CROW Case Of The Week: Snail Kite

he snail kite (Rostrhamus sociabilis) is a medium-sized hawk with broad wings, a down-curved bill and a square tail. The male differs from the female in color, with the male being all gray and the

female sporting stripes. South Florida is possibly the only region in the United States that one can find this bird of prey. The bird is regarded as endangered in the state and nationally due to disrupted water flow and the decline of snails, which the snail kite primarily feeds on. There is hope the snail kite continues to adapt to feeding on the relatively newly established apple snail, an exotic species that is larger than the typical snail.

At CROW, an adult male snail kite was admitted from Fort Myers near Interstate 75 after a possible collision with a vehicle. The kite suffered several injuries including severe trauma to its head and right eye, a fractured right ulna and fractured left metacarpals. After the patient rested a few days after intake, CROW officials stated surgery was performed to place a pin in the right ulna to stabilize that fracture and a splint was placed on the left metacarpals to stabilize

those fractures.

"Overall, the kite is doing very well considering the numerous injuries it sustained," said Dr. Julia Hill, CROW veterinary intern. "At first, it was very down due to the head trauma. Once we were able to stabilize the fractures, its mentality improved significantly.

"We placed an intramedullary (IM) pin to stabilize the fractured ulna. This allows for movement of the wing while the fracture heals. The splint was removed last week once radiographs indicated that strong, bony callous had formed over the fractured metacarpals. The fracture is healing well and the kite has been observed taking short flights in the outside enclosure."

Initially, veterinarians opted not to remove the damaged eye, but it was later deemed necessary. That removal occurred 12 days after intake.

"Before we remove an eye, we will allow a period of time to determine if the eye is functional or will regain function," said Dr. Hill. "In this case, after the period of time, we were able to ascertain that the eye was not functional

Luckily, since the snail kite dines on passive game, it can survive with one eye in the wild.

"Due to the kite's unique diet of slow-moving prey, it will still be able to find its food easily with one eye," said Dr. Hill. "Studies suggest that birds have special magnetic sensors in their eyes to navigate during migration, but because Florida's snail kites are year-round residents, this will not be an issue.

Even with such debilitating injuries,

the snail kite appears to be healing well and ready for what 2018 has in store. Its stay at the clinic may reach six or seven weeks.

"The snail kite has been doing very well and has a great appetite. It was moved to an outside enclosure on December 28 and the IM pin (was) scheduled to be removed on Thursday, January 4," said Dr. Hill. "Once the pin is removed, the kite will need approximately

one to two weeks of conditioning before it will be considered for release.

# Constantly Changing Conditions

The week from Christmas to New Years is always one of the busier weeks on the water. Among my local fishing guide friends, we know it as "hell week' as it just does not get

any busier out on the water. This proved very true during this year's Christmas week with lots of people out on their boats while escaping the cold of the north and enjoying a Southwest Florida Christmas. Dense fog, cold, wind and sunshine where all part of this week's conditions that made both fishing and boating anywhere from really good to really challenging, often all within a period of a few hours.

Tides were far from good this whole week with anglers often getting a period of slight moving to non-moving water. That made the bite just grind to a halt. When we did have moving water, my anglers caught lots of snook along with a few redfish and some of the larger trout I have caught in the last few weeks. There is nothing more frustrating as a guide than when you know you are set up in the fish and, because of the lack of tide movement, the fish will just not eat a bait. All my trips this week seemed to have a few great hours of action once the tide finally began to move. During the periods of no tide, it was like beating your head against a wall with little to no action at all.

During those periods of little to no tide, I spent my time tucked back in narrow mangrove creeks that seemed to at least have a little water movement most of the time. Live shiners caught lots of snook along with many mangrove snapper. As the water flow got better, that's when we seemed to catch our redfish back in these same creeks along with lots and lots of snook. A few of these narrow mangrove creeks I frequent this time of year had schools of hungry-roaming jack crevalle that chummed up on live shiners, blew up all over the surface and resulted in multiple hook-ups and smiling faces.

With another cold blast in the forecast for early this week, it will kick our sheepshead bite into high gear. On trips this week when I have shrimp-fished and targeted sheepshead, we have managed to catch a few legal-sized fish even though the abundance of small mangrove snapper have made it tough going. Areas in and around the passes will see the first big push of larger sheepshead as they move in from offshore to spawn as conditions get colder. If conditions stay cold, we will see these fish on basically every dock and in every deep mangrove creek and shoreline throughout the whole area or basically any structure that has barnacles on it for them to graze on.

## Plant Smart Bengal Clock Vine

Bengal clock vine's (Thunbergia grandiflora) showy lavender-blue flowers give it several common names, including sky flower and sky vine. The flower shape inspires the name Bengal trumpet.

The cultivar "Alba" has white rather than bluish flowers. As the name implies, this

species is a native of India. It is one of four Thunbergias in Florida, all non-native.

This hardy spreading twining vine can be erect or climbing, growing as much as 20 or 30 feet in a year. It is potentially invasive, so be careful where you plant it. It has escaped cultivation in Florida.

The numerous drooping clusters of flowers on the dense foliage make it superficially resemble a morning glory vine. The bell-shaped white- or yellow- throated flowers measure about three inches across, thus the term

Grandiflora, Latin for large-flowered.

The opposite evergreen leaves are heart-shaped and broad, the seed capsule inconspicuous and beaked. Bengal clock vine prefers full sun to partial shade, plenty of moisture, and well-drained soil.

Like many aggressive cascading vines, it works well on a trellis or fence, in planters, or as a hanging plant. It flowers all year. It has moderate drought tolerance, low salt tolerance and is prone to nematodes and iron deficiency. The leaves are used medicinally in Malay culture.

If you're set on having a blue- or lavender-flowered vine in your landscape, consider skyblue clustervine (*Jacquemontia pentanthos*) instead. That native, also called blue jacquemontia and Key West morning-glory, is endangered in the state and attracts many native pollinators and is a nectar source for butterflies.



#### Financial Focus Time For New Year's Financial Resolutions

e've reached the end of another year – which means it's just about time for some New Year's resolutions. Would you like to study a new language, take up a musical

instrument or visit the gym more often? All these are worthy goals, of course, but why not also add some financial resolutions?

Here are some ideas to think about:

Increase contributions to your employer-sponsored retirement plan. For 2018, you can contribute up to \$18,500 (or \$24,500 if you're age 50 or older) to your 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b), for employees of public schools and some nonprofit groups, or a 457(b) plan, for employees of local governments. It's usually a good idea to contribute as much as you can afford to your employer's plan, as your contributions may lower your taxable income, while your earnings can grow tax-deferred. At a minimum, put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

Try to "max out" on your IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or similar plan, you can probably still invest in an IRA. For 2018, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to a traditional or Roth IRA, or \$6,500 if you're age 50 or older. (Income restrictions apply to Roth IRAs.) Contributions to a traditional IRA may be tax-deductible, depending on your income, and your earnings can grow tax-deferred. Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but earnings can grow tax-free, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you are age 59-1/2and you've had your account at least five years. You can put virtually any investment in an IRA, so it can expand your options beyond those offered in your 401(k) or similar plan.

Build an emergency fund. Try to build an emergency fund conaining three to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money held in a low-risk, liquid account. This fund can help you avoid dipping into your long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a new furnace or a major car repair.

Control your debts. It's never easy, but do what you can to keep your debts under control. The less you have to spend on debt payments, the more you can invest for your future.

Don't overreact to changes in the financial markets. We've had a long run of rising stock prices – but it won't last forever. If we experience a sharp market downturn in 2018, don't overreact by taking a "time out" from investing. Market drops are a normal feature of

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the investment landscape, and you may ultimately gain an advantage by buying new shares when their prices are down.

Review your goals and risk tolerance. At least once in 2018, take some time to review your short- and long-term financial goals and try to determine, possibly with the help of a financial professional, if your investment portfolio is still appropriate for these goals. At the same time, you'll want to re-evaluate your risk tolerance to ensure you're not taking too much risk – or possibly too little

# School Smart

Shelley, My daughter goes away to college next fall. I would like to start helping her take more responsibility for her life. What are some things

that you think she needs to learn to be independent and happy?

Janice W, Fort Myers

#### Janice,

It's so important for kids to have had an opportunity to learn some basic life skills before they go away to college. Time management skills are crucial for success at school and in life, and now is the time for you to start teaching these skills to your daughter. Have a discussion with your daughter to help her realize that after high school, she probably won't have someone regularly checking in with her, perhaps helping with homework and reminding her to leave for work/sports team practice, let alone any housekeeping and laundry chores she will encounter at college. Explain that working on time management skills now may help her understand how much time she needs for various assignments and projects, and still have for socializing with friends, time to relax and hopefully have fun.

Here are some of the factors to consider in mastering time management. Try to practice these skills before she transitions out of high school and onto the next phase of her life. Learning these skills will make her (and you) feel more prepared, organized and independent.

Planning. It helps to have a general plan for each day. While the time chunk at school is evident, the other parts of the day are less structured. Encourage her to create a time structure of when she will take care of assignments, obligations, chores and when she can take some time for herself.

Prioritizing. Some things are more

important than others. She will need to realize that she must take care of the important and urgent items before the things that can wait. And make sure she knows that, with longer-term projects, she doesn't need to do the whole thing at once. Learning how to break projects into workable units is very useful.

Staying organized. Keeping one's obligations and activities organized is essential. Schools today work hard to help kids understand the value of keeping a calendar. If she hasn't done this yet, it's time to begin. Let her experiment with both paper and app calendars. Finding one she likes and will look forward to using is key. Also, keeping a list of tasks can be very helpful for prioritizing and organization. Learning these skills are critical.

Keeping balanced. Help your daughter understand that life needs balance – all work or all fun isn't healthy. Talk about finding ways to balance schoolwork, other obligations, self-care (meals, sleep, and exercise), social life and fun. Explain how finding a balance will help her to be more efficient and effective in whatever she is working towards.

Learning to handle unstructured time. Your daughter will have lots of free time in college. This will give her a chance to relax, read a good book, catch up with friends, think, or even take a nap. However, some people find they have difficulty dealing with time when there is no set schedule or activities. Help her learn how to fill unstructured time successfully. One way to think about this is to work with her to identify things she likes to do that she doesn't always have time for on busy days. Unstructured times are her chance to do some of these things instead of wasting it away.


#### **Book Review** Manhattan Beach



anhattan Beach by Jennifer Egan made it to the best seller lists for a few weeks and that caught my eye. It begins in 1934 with Anna Kerrigan, nearly 12 years old, accompanying


her father Eddie to visit Dexter Styles, a man with a Gatsby air about him, who she realizes is crucial to the survival of her family. It's a palatial oceanside home, and she is mesmerized by the sea beyond the house and by some charged mystery between the two men. She intrigues Styles with a flash of youthful defiance. Eddie asks Styles for a job because he's tired of acting as a bagman for a crooked union official.

Eight years later, her father has disappeared, the country is at war and Anna is living with her mother and younger sister Lydia, a girl with a lovely face and palsied limbs. Anna loves her sister and does everything she can to make her life meaningful. She works at the Brooklyn Naval Yard, where women are allowed to hold jobs that once belonged to men, now soldiers abroad. She becomes the first female diver, a dangerous job that also has prestige. She also helps repair the ships that will help America win the war.



As Anna descends into the water, she touches the ship's hull and this is what she feels. "Her skin prickled into goosefish. The ship felt alert, alive. It exuded a hum that traveled through her fingers up her arm: the vibration of thousands of souls teeming within. Like a skyscraper turned on its side."

One evening at a nightclub, she again meets Dexter Styles and starts to understand the complexity of her father's life, and why he might have vanished. This historical novel follows Anna and Styles into a world full of gangsters, sailors, divers, bankers and union men. Disastrous consequences occur for both protagonists as the author intertwines three narratives to tell us what happened to Eddie. Manhattan Beach is a dazzling, propulsive exploration of a transformative moment in the lives and identities of women and men, of America and the world.袋

# It's A \$1.5 Billion Bonanza Those 40 College Football Bowl Games

Tf you're bleary from watching 39 college football bowl games, did you ever consider the staggering economic impact of these contests?

The bowl games began December 16 with the New Orleans Bowl when Troy defeated North Texas, and will conclude Monday night in the championship game in Atlanta when Georgia faces Alabama (the 40th bowl game) for college football's biggest prize.

That game alone will generate at least a \$300 million impact, according to past studies.

But let's look at the overall impact of these 40 bowl games: A report at the end of the 2015 season compiled by San Diego State University's Payne School of Hospitality & Tourism Management and George Washington University calculated the economic impact of all 40 bowl games at \$1.5 billion.

This figure, of course, includes both direct and indirect spending. The Rose Bowl is the "Granddaddy" of all bowl games and generates more than \$300 million in spending. It and the Tournament of Roses Parade is the largest one-day attraction in the Los Angeles area – bigger than the Oscars.

These huge figures really tell only a portion of the story.

Here's what the individual conferences will receive in payouts for these bowl games:

Big Ten – \$89.5 million; \$54 million in base payout plus \$4 million for Ohio State in the Cotton Bowl; \$4 million for Penn State in the Fiesta Bowl and \$27.5 million for Wisconsin's Orange Bowl berth.

Normally, these proceeds are then split among all conference members.

ACC – \$87.5 million SEC – \$70 million

Pac-12 – \$62 million

Big 12 - \$60 million

In 1955, there were only seven bowl games. Today, we have 40. And we're certain this billion dollar-plus enterprise will continue to escalate in the years ahead.



With a continued belief in lifelong learning, Dr. King completed her doctor of ministry degree from the Ecumenical Theological Seminary of Detroit, Michigan on June 2, 2012 at age 81. She has also received several honorary doctoral degrees.

She began following her dream of becoming a minister as the program administrator at Christ Universal Temple (Chicago) under her spiritual mentor, Reverend Dr. Johnnie Colemon. She is an ordained minister, a professionally trained social work administrator, has served as dean of community relations at Malcolm X College in Chicago, and was a college instructor as well as dean of students at Spelman College in Atlanta. Dr. King was the first non-psychiatrist director of the Emory Mental Health Center, which was headquartered in the Southside Comprehensive Health Center in Atlanta.

Dr. King has authored 10 books and monographs, including the widely acclaimed Transform Your Life. She is also a major contributor to A New Thought for A New Millenium and Wake Up... Live the Life You Love in Spirit. Her most recent publications are In Me, As Me: Ten Principles for Finding the Divine Within and Leave With Love: A Spiritual Guide to Succession Planning. In 2016, a revised and expanded edition of Transform Your Life with exercises at the end of each chapter was released. She has also written several magazine articles and essays.

Dr. King hosted her own television program, A New Thought, A New Life, and has appeared as a guest on shows produced by Oprah Winfrey and Tavis Smiley. She has been called upon to offer commentary on national news programs, given guidance and counsel to heads of state, and participated in White House conferences and consultation with U.S. Presidents Carter and Clinton.

Throughout her professional life, she has received numerous honors, awards and recognition. In the New Thought movement, she was awarded the three highest honors: The International New Thought Alliance (INTA) Life Achievement Award; the Ernest Holmes Religious Science Award; and Unity's the Light of God Expressing Award.

In 2001 Dr. King received the highest honor ever bestowed upon a woman when she was enstooled as the first female chief at Assin Nsuta, Ghana, West Africa, of the Ashante tribe. Her stool name is Nana Yaa Twumwaa 1.

A la around the world, the typical advice for a simple ankle sprain is basically wrong. After a joint injury, the treatment should be MEAT (Movement, Exercise, Analgesics and Treatment) versus RICE (Rest, Ice, Compression and Elevation.) RICE treatments actually prevent full healing instead of assisting the body to heal.

It's important to remember that ligament injuries cannot be treated the same as muscle injuries. Muscles are very vascular structures, beefy and red; whereas the white structures of the body, including the tendons, ligaments, menisci, labrum and articular cartilage, have little or no blood supply. The RICE treatment decreases blood flow further, and leads to incomplete healing of soft tissue, whereas MEAT encourages complete healing. Muscles can undergo the RICE treatments and feel immediately better and avoid compromised healing because of the large influx of healing cells available, despite the non-healing aspects of the RICE protocol. The white structures are not so lucky, and research has shown that the RICE protocol inhibits healing.

The RICE treatment is often administered to athletes after badly spraining an ankle, tearing the meniscus in the knee, or sustaining some other type of sports injury. Athletes can be seen with ice packs taped to the injured joint. But realize that the inflammation resulting after these injuries is nature's attempt to heal the injuries as quickly as possible. Using RICE treatments eliminate this chemistry, even though they may offer short-term pain relief.

The MEAT protocol, including regenerative injection treatments for more severe injuries, stimulates the repair of the soft tissue structures that are causing the joint instability. Realize that even the creator of the RICE protocol, Gabe Mirkin, MD, has stated that inflammation is necessary for healing and that RICE can delay healing. What does the body want to do after an injury? Heal, of course.

What do you think the reason is that we do not keep our New Year's resolutions?

There are two reasons. The main one is our self-defeating stories, and two, habits that we've held for years. One of my favorite books on this topic is *The Power of Habit* by Charles Duhigg.

Next, let's look at some of what Isaiah Hankel has to say on the power of our self-stories, he's just released a new book, *The Science of Intelligent Achievement: How Smart People Focus, Create and Grow Their Way to Success* (Capstone 2018). One of my favorite quotes from Mr. Hankel is: In order to change your big story, you have to change the little stories.

You know which stories don't you? Have you ever heard yourself say any of these:

I'll never be thin because I've been overweight for 16 yeas now.

It's more important that I'm available for him now, I'll concentrate on me later.

I hate myself, I hate my body... I'm so stupid.

By telling yourself these negative

shot was struck to begin a golf course known as Fort Myers Country Club;

As early as March 1918, the Fort Myers Country Club hosted the first professional golf tournament in Southwest Florida known at the South Florida Open;

In subsequent decades, the Fort Myers Country Club hosted Hall of Famers including Arnold Palmer and Patty Berg along with countless major champions and tour winners. 





# Many Puppies Up For Adoption Despite Surgeries

The Gulf Coast Humane Society's (GCHS) Spay and Neuter Clinic hit a major milestone in late December when the staff performed its 10,000th surgery since it open on August 25, 2015.

The milestone was in large part due to the rising number of surgeries performed in 2017, with over 5,000 animals either spayed or neutered.

In actuality, that is a huge volume of animals that will be saved from being either homeless or euthanized due to the pet overpopulation challenge the country faces today.

But, unfortunately, even 10,000 spay/neuter surgeries haven't been enough in the five-county area.

"We are thrilled to have hit the 10,000 surgery milestone and that certainly has made a dent in the pet population since 2015," said GCHS Executive Director Jennifer Galloway. "But the challenge of curbing the pet population is still strong. We have had an influx of pregnant mother K9s come in the last couple of weeks and by the

time they all are done giving birth, we'll have around 50 puppies at the shelter or in foster care."

Per Florida law, all animals which are put up for adoption at any shelter will have to be either spayed or neutered. So mark up at least 50 more surgeries for the Spay-Neuter Clinic in January and February to come.

Currently, GCHS has half a dozen

mother dogs who have – or are going to – give birth to litters of puppies. In one litter, nine puppies were born to mama Joanie, while the shelter also had a Christmas Day present with a litter being born on the holiday by mama Pixie.

"We love puppies, but with the way the pet population is growing, there will always be a need for shelters," Galloway said. "There are just not enough homes to go around with all the puppies and kittens being born annually, which also results in less homes for the adult dogs and cats, as well."

As is the case of most animal shelters, euthanasia is one way to create more kennel space. According to statistics researched by the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), approximately 1.5 million shelter animals are euthanized (670,000 dogs and 860,000 cats) annually.


That number is significantly down from 2011, when 2.6 million dogs and cats were euthanized, which is partially due to a rise in people adopting their pets instead of buying them as well as the rise of people microchipping their animals, which has led to more lost animals being returned to their owners.

But the best tool in lowering the pet population is spaying and neutering, plus there are healthy benefits for fixing your pet as well.

Spaying helps your female dogs and cats avoid uterine infections and breast tumors. Neutering your male forever friend prevents testicular cancer and some prostate problems as well.

Female pets will not go into heat and for males, roaming problems will continued on page 31


