Brown, 76, is known for her lifetime of service to her country, medical field and Southwest Florida community. With decades of experience as an advanced registered nurse practitioner and health care provider, Brown is also a veteran

Historic Downtown Fort Myers, Then And Now: Eminent Four Gather For Thomas Edison's Birthday

Even before the 1st annual Edison Festival and Pageant of Light in February 1938, Fort Myers had long been in the habit of formally recognizing its most famous citizen, Thomas A. Edison, each year on his birthday on February 11.

After his death in 1931, Fort Myers continued to honor him on or around that date with an array of events, from memorial services to today's Festival of Light. The special date conveniently coincided with his and Mina Edison's seasonal visits.

Edison's 82nd birthday in 1929 was one of the more

newsworthy, for U.S. President-elect Herbert Hoover, automobile manufacturer Henry Ford and tire manufacturer Harvey Firestone made a point of being in town for the birthday celebration.

Of course, Hoover attracted the most attention, for he was to be inaugurated in only a few weeks. (At that time, presidential inaugurations were held in March.)

Hoover's name congers up thoughts of the Great Depression, but to understand the mood of February of that year, consider that it was not until the stock-market crash of October 29 that the national economy plunged.

Bear in mind, however, that Florida's economy was already in a prelude to the Depression due to the 1926 and 1928 hurricanes.

Hoover sailed to Fort Myers on his yacht *Saunterer* from Miami. He was a guest of the Edisons at their winter estate, Seminole Lodge, and joined in the festivities planned for the inventor's birthday. Henry Ford arrived for his seasonal visit and was in residence at his own winter estate next door to the Edisons.

The inventor made it known that he wanted time alone with his special guests. hat contrasted with the usual media frenzy that occurred when Edison participated in public events. Newsreel film crews often showed up in Fort Myers when Edison was in residence. While he gave his usual birthday interview, he allowed no photographers or newsreel crews to be present. And, for the duration of Hoover's short visit, no visitors or

journalists were allowed.

Only the local press was invited to the birthday dinner at his home.


Of particular concern was the inventor's health, especially given his age and the fact that each day he still put in a hard day's scientific work.

The presence of four famous men, nevertheless, focused the nation's attention on Fort Myers and attracted not only news crews but large numbers of tourists.

Events planned in his honor included a musical recital by famed lyric baritone Verman Kimbrough and the dedication of the Thomas Goolsby Boy Scout Memorial Building in City Park, the latter attended by Barron G. Collier. In the evening, Edison generated even more news with a nationally broadcast radio address from Seminole Lodge.

Perhaps the biggest event of the day, however, was a grand parade in lieu of the

Edison's 172nd Birthday To Be Celebrated

The Edison and Ford Winter Estates will host Thomas Edison's 172nd birthday on Monday, February 11 at 10 a.m. As part of the celebration, students from the Edison Park Creative and Expressive Arts School will sing, dance and play stringed instruments, and birthday cake will be served.

Edison's birthday is an Edison Festival of Light-sanctioned event. The Fort Myers photo provided

festival honors Thomas Edison, his achievements and his contributions to Fort Myers.

Historically, local school children performed for Edison on his birthday. Today, the school's rich program encourages students to excel in all curricula by integrating the performing and visual arts. More than 10 years ago, teachers from the school reinstated the historic dance program that features music and dance of the Edison Era as well as contemporary favorites.

The birthday party is a free public event with limited seating. It does not include tours or admission to the museum or lab.

The party is sponsored in part by the Edison Festival of Light, the organization founded in 1938 that holds annual events to memorialize Thomas Edison.

IMAG Exhibit On Local WWII Participation

he IMAG History and Science Center (IMAG) has a new, permanent exhibit titled WWII in Southwest Florida. The exhibit features rarely-before-seen local artifacts showcasing the impact of the war on residents of the Fort Myers community. The exhibit includes a series of narrative panels outlining war efforts at two local landmarks, Paige and Buckingham fields. The display also highlights a Flexible Gunnery training video typical of what World War II (WWII) era soldiers experienced, prominent radio addresses and WWII Army Air Force uniforms. The exhibit is the result of a collaboration between the IMAG and the Florida Gulf Coast University History Program.

"This new exhibit gives insight into the rich history of Fort Myers and the contributions made by locals throughout World War II. We anticipate it will be of much interest to residents and visitors of Southwest Florida. We are fortunate to have many veterans of WWII in the area, including some of whom trained for the war at Buckingham and Page fields. We trust this exhibit will provide new insights into this era in national and local history and serve as a reminder of the sacrifice made by so many in this region," said IMAG Executive Director Matt Johnson.

Step back in time and get a glimpse of the many facets of war. Visitors can expect to experience WWII radio addresses that include a variety of speeches from the 1940s, such as Franklin D. Roosevelt's address to Congress and the NBC Radio announcement of D-Day. The exhibit showcases the history of Buckingham Field as it evolved from an aerial gunnery school to the headquarters of Lee Country Mosquito Control District. Guests will have the opportunity to view photos depicting the transformation of Page Field from an emergency landing strip during the heart of the war to a full-fledged air force base.

Entry to the exhibit is included with the price of admission to the IMAG. Cost of entrance is \$14 for adults, \$12 for seniors ages 55 and older, and \$10 for children ages 3 through 12.

Lovegrove Retrospective Now On Exhibit

How does a woman recover from a breast cancer diagnosis, emergency surgery and radiation therapy? Well, if she's Matlacha Impressionist Leoma Lovegrove, it's by staging an impressive retrospective of her work at an equally impressive venue. Here, There and Everywhere is now on view at ONE/Allure's Sales Center in the downtown Fort Myers'

River District.

"We are humbled and honored to have Leoma Lovegrove exhibiting her beautiful high-energy art here at our sales gallery," stated Barbara Bengochea-Perez, director of sales and marketing for ONE/Allure. "I have personally been a longtime fan of her work, and we know that everyone in the community will be excited to see her work return to downtown Fort Myers."

Lovegrove last exhibited a retrospective of her work at the Sidney & Berne Davis Art Center in January 2017. Palettes: Past, Present & Pursuits included more than 200 paintings, 2D and 3D mixed media works, sculpture and art clothing and holds the distinction of being one of the Davis Art Center's most popular and well attended shows.

The ONE/Allure's Sales Center will feature roughly 60 pieces of Lovegrove's most representative work, displayed in a refined upscale residential setting that evokes the discriminating taste that will define the 34 spacious SkyRises – two residences per floor that Miami-based developer JAXI Builders expects to include in its 21-story waterfront residences that will be available for only a

"I've always wanted to exhibit in the historic City Pier building," Lovegrove said. Prior to serving as ONE/ Allure's sales office, the two-story building was home to Al Oerter's Art of the Olympians. The facility and associated dock was originally constructed as a ferry terminal for a shuttle service to Key West.

The artist went public with her diagnosis and treatment to encourage women to be assertive when it comes to their health and speak up if something doesn't feel quite right. Leoma insisted on an MRI after being told that nothing was wrong and to check back in six months.

Lovegrove has long been an advocate for cancer awareness and recovery. Not only does she observe National Cancer Survivors Day each June and Breast Cancer Awareness Month each October, the artist lost a sister to cancer several years ago.

Possessed of a deep and abiding faith and unyielding work ethic, Lovegrove now feels that painting and exhibiting her artwork is the best medicine for her complete recovery. Known as the People's Painter, Leoma is inspired by the public to pick up a brush and create for the greater good.

Towards that end, she plans to be in the house for each Art Walk and Music Walk during the 2019-20 seasons to meet and greet visitors and perform Paint Out Loud events.

Lovegrove is an impressionist-expressionist painter known worldwide for her vivid colorful paintings. Nationally, her works are represented in numerous galleries. Her portrait of Jimmy Carter hangs in his Presidential Library in Atlanta. Her work is also included in the private collection of the White House in Washington, DC, in President George W. Bush's Presidential Library in Dallas, Texas, and has also graced the windows at Rockefeller Center in New York City.

Internationally, Lovegrove was commissioned to paint a portrait of Richard Branson for the Virgin Airlines headquarters in London. Her Beatles series drew the attention of the city of Liverpool. She was the first American to paint on the replica of Claude Monet's floating studio in Giverny, France, and she was honored to be the first American artist to exhibit, *An American in Giverny*, in the famous Pierre Bonnard home in Vernon, France.

Here, There and Everywhere will hang for two years, with new pieces added during holidays. All artwork is for sale.



usual public birthday party for Edison. The half-hour, six-car parade included five Lincoln automobiles supplied by Henry Ford. The procession traveled from the Edison Estate east to Evans Avenue and then looped back.

Local dignitaries, such as Mayor Elmer Hough, traveled in the first car, with Hoover and the inventor occupying the second car. The president-elect's personal secret service men followed up in the third. Mrs. Edison and Mrs. Hoover rode together, and the Fords and Firestones each had a car.

Herbert Hoover, Jr. and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Ricard, New York friends of the president-elect, occupied a car too. An estimated 20 thousand people

An estimated 20 thousand people turned out along the route. Schools were let out for the parade. In fact, Edison and Hoover paused to interact with school children stationed at several points along the way.

points along the way. Heading west on First Street, the procession paused for Rossie Lewis Evans Alderman to present Mrs. Hoover with a bouquet of roses as she passed her home. (Note: That historic home has recently been converted into a bed and breakfast.)

The historic photo shows several of the cars in front of the Belmar Building on Broadway in the final stretch of the parade. The cars are approaching the intersection at Main Street, where they turned west to return to the Edison home. The city would not have many more celebrations of Edison during his lifetime. Two years later, he made his last trip to Fort Myers and dedicated the Edison Bridge on his birthday. He died later that year.

The city has held memorials and celebrations in his honor until this day.

Walk down to Broadway and imagine the excitement when Hoover, Firestone, Ford, and a crowd of thousands converged to honor Edison. Then visit the following two research centers to learn about Fort Myers's long relationship with its most famous citizen.

crow case of the week: Virginia Opossum

The Virginia opossum (Didelphis virginiana), also referred to as "possum" to many southerners, is North America's only marsupial, an animal that has a pouch, like the

Australian kangaroo or koala. It is also one of the Earth's oldest mammals.

The nocturnal animal begins its life as tiny as a honeybee and immediately crawls into its mother's pouch to develop further. Interestingly, a female opossum may give birth to as many as 20 babies in a litter, but fewer than half of them survive. Unfortunately, some never even make it as far as the pouch.

Virginia opossums are omnivorous, enjoying a diet both rich in plants and animals.

At CROW, an adult female Virginia opossum was admitted from Estero after suffering head trauma, possibly from being struck by a vehicle. The patient was stabilized overnight with fluid therapy, pain medication and anti-inflammatories. The following day, the opossum was anesthetized and a full set of radiographs were taken. The radiographs revealed that the opossum's right upper canine and premolar were avulsed. The radiographs also showed fractures to both the upper and lower jaw. Later that day, the first of two surgeries was performed to remove the affected teeth.

"In total, three teeth were extracted. The most significant was the canine tooth, but there were two smaller premolar teeth that were extracted as well," said Dr. Kyle Abbott, CROW veterinary intern. "Teeth fractures unfortunately cannot heal and so any fractured teeth were extracted. Root canals are often the treatment for fractured teeth in pets, but these are complex procedures and not required in an opossum."

A day later, the patient underwent another surgery to hold the fractured area in place using wire.

"The surgery to stabilize the mandible, lower jaw, involved wrapping the wires around the jaw as well as teeth on both sides of the fracture," said Dr. Abbott. "The wire apparatus was left in place for two weeks while the soft tissues formed a callus to stabilize the fracture."

CROW officials reported the injuries have been healing appropriately, to the point that the wires were recently able to be removed.

"This opossum was certainly in a lot of pain with the fractures she sustained. She was kept on pain medications for a few weeks after the fractures occurred," said Dr. Abbott. "It is interesting to know that the opossum has the most teeth of any North American land mammal, and she will do well without these teeth because she has many others for eating."

The patient is still being offered a soft

food diet, but will be transitioned to more solid food in the near future.

"The opossum will be transitioned over the course of a week to harder foods as long as she is able to eat the harder foods without issues," said Dr. Abbott.

The patient's release window will open only when she adapts to the food she will encounter in the wild.

"The opossum will be released once it can eat a normal opossum diet, which is a large variety of both soft and hard foods. They are omnivores and will eat plants and animals. Once she can eat all foods offered without issue, then she will be ready for release."

"Top 5 Breakfast in Florida" - Southern Living

t feels so good to be finally getting back to a much more normal Florida winter weather pattern. I am glad to report that I have hung up the thermals for now and have

really been enjoying the bright sunshine and light wind days that are associated with February. Water temperatures have begun to slowly creep back to normal levels after bottoming out in the high 50s last week.

This week, I took a morning on the water to go out and scout some areas that have been very productive in years past. Often, when fishing with clients, you simply cannot try these areas if you do not know if they are holding fish. It's just as important to know where the fish are not as well as where they are. Due to time restraints on a four-hour charter, I need to fish in the most productive areas.

On this scouting trip, I needed to check out some places in the south end of Matlacha Pass along with favorite Ding Darling creeks that require an idle to reach. Getting away from my daily routine of bouncing in and around the passes only lets me know I'm fishing in the right places as these other areas had very few fish and were a bust.

Our fishing has been very different this winter than in previous winters with

many places in the southern sound being just void of fish. Ding Darling creeks that I often fish with great success are holding very few fish. Though these creeks have mullet and a few sheepshead in them, they are just not stacked up with the sheepshead and snook like in past years. The water in these creeks is crystal clear so spotting fish and getting an accurate read is easy.

Other places like the docks and canals in the southern sound from the lighthouse to the powerlines have almost zero sheepshead in them, when in previous years, these areas had thousands of fish in them. All I can speculate is that the barnacles that these fish feed on in these places are covered up with a mossy-like substance and possibly dead.

Once I get north of the powerlines, I'm finding lots of fish in all the usual places I would get them any other winter. Sheepshead, black drum and rat redfish made up the majority of our fish again this week. With a few flat spots of very little tide movement, the bite would slow. Then, as expected, as the tide picked up speed, the action would pick up too.

No matter how long you fish a place, you are always learning something new about it. This has proved very true this winter with our fish being in different places than in years past. Areas in the southern sound have just not had the abundance of life like they had in years past, while areas from the middle sound north are better fishing than I can remember. If you are not catching fish in your usual places, it's time to do what I did this week and take a day to go scout.

by Gerri Reaves

Firebush (Hamelia patens) has understandably become one of South Florida's most widely used shrubs or small trees. This native's attributes include low maintenance, beautiful foliage and flowers, showy fruit and notable wildlife friendliness.

It should be included in any butterfly or natural garden. Indeed, its versatility qualifies it as a landscape staple – a veritable single-plant wildlife habitat. In the wild, it's found in hammocks, shell mounds and coastal and upland forests.

This fast-growing species grows as a multi-stemmed shrub or small tree, reaching up to 12 feet tall and often growing as wide as it is tall.

It is a member of the madder family and a relative of gardenia and coffee. The clusters of orange-red flowers

The clusters of orange-red flowers are a major nectar source for a wide variety of butterflies, especially the zebra longwing, hummingbirds and bees. Their color gives the plant another common name, scarletbush. Sphinx and Pluto sphinx moths use

Sphinx and Pluto sphinx moths use species is used as a larval, or host, plant. The tubular flowers are about an inch and a half long, and bloom throughout the year. In fact, fruit and flowers in various stages of growth often exist on the plant.

The juicy berries, which ripen to a glossy purple-black, are a fourth- to

a half-inch across. They are a food source for small mammals and many bird species, including mockingbirds, blue-headed vireos and catbirds.

The fruit is said to be edible for people too.

The whorled oval leaves and the stems have a reddish tint. Textured and evergreen, they measure five to eight inches long. The foliage provides cover for birds and other wildlife.

Firebush has medium-to-high drought tolerance and low salt tolerance. It is wind-resistant and sensitive to cold.

It adapts to various light conditions, but flowers most in full sun. A shaded plant, however, will develop more

attractive foliage. Give it sandy welldrained soil.

Use it as a specimen plant, background, or screen. If you use it as a hedge, take care not to "hatrack" it and rob wildlife of nectar, cover and nesting sites.

Leaving the ripened berries on the plant, even if they look dried up, might be a boost for migrating birds.

Propagate it with seeds and cuttings.

Will Power Writing In The Margins

Growing up, I watched my great-grandmother, who I affectionately referred to as my Bubby, cook family meals with an old cookbook that had a worn spine and dog-eared pages smeared with stains. When Bubby discovered how to improve a recipe, she would write notes on the margins of the pages. Her modifications were always first rate. But I want to tell you not to write notes or changes in your legal documents like a will or a trust. I can't describe how many times I've seen wills where changes have been written

in the margins. Some changes delete beneficiaries, others add beneficiaries. Some change the dollar amount of bequests, while others alter who is to receive what property.

Unlike the alterations my Bubby made in the margins of her cookbook, the writings in the margins of these folks' wills and trusts almost always have no significance. They won't serve to change the will or trust.

Why?


Because the law clearly states how a testamentary (after death) bequest must be both signed and witnessed in a very specific manner. In Florida, a testator must sign a legal document that contains testamentary bequests at its end. The testator must sign in the presence of two witnesses, who sign as witnesses in the presence of the testator, as well as in the presence of each other.

Then, so you don't have to get the witnesses' testimony about the signing after the testator's death, the will is usually "self proved." In order to be self-proved, a notary must witness the whole process in much the same manner and sign a statement using the exact words found in the Florida statute.

So, if Julia signs her will, but later goes back and writes changes in the margins, those changes will have no legal effect. The only result of Julia's action is likely litigation between the beneficiaries. After the beneficiaries spend thousands of dollars on attorney fees, the result will be that the margin changes will be disregarded.

What Julia needs to do if she wants to change her will is to add a codicil to her will (or an amendment to her trust) that is signed with the same statutory formalities that her original document was signed with.

Sometimes individuals will type up their own codicils and amendments rather

They may not want to pay the attorney for a simple change. Do this at your own risk, as oftentimes a codicil or amendment isn't so simple. If it isn't prepared correctly, it could cause more problems than it solves.

Consider, for example, that Hayden has a will that says something to the effect of, "I give my home to my son Payne." At the time of the creation of the original will, Hayden's home is in Atlanta. Hayden later gives his Atlanta home to Payne and then purchases a new home for himself on Sanibel. Hayden feels that he should give his daughter Suzanne a large specific bequest to "even out" the gift of the Atlanta residence to Payne, so he writes in the margin of his will, "I give \$150,000 to my daughter Suzanne" but doesn't remove the language in his document giving his home to Payne.

Hayden then dies.

What happens? The margin note of the \$150,000 bequest is disregarded. It wasn't signed with the statutory formalities.

But has Hayden also bequeathed his Sanibel residence to Payne? Florida has an ademption statute that says in part, "Property that a testator gave to a person in the testator's lifetime is treated as a satisfaction of a devise to that person, in whole or in part, only if the will provides for deduction of the lifetime gift, the testator declares in a contemporaneous writing that the gift is to be deducted from the devise or is in satisfaction of the devise, or the devisee acknowledges in writing that the gift is in satisfaction."

Even if the margin note gifting \$150,000 to Suzanne is not a valid amendment, could it be construed as a "contemporaneous writing" that the lifetime gift of the Atlanta home satisfies the bequest found in Hayden's will? That position would be a stretch even if it can be established that the gift was made in an attempt to even the score. In this fact pattern, the statute would seem to require Payne to acknowledge in writing that the gift of the Atlanta residence satisfied his father's bequest. What if Payne isn't willing to sign such a statement?

There are many laws governing estates and trusts. Writing your own document without the knowledge of what those laws are and how those laws affect your own plan may lead to unintended consequences.

So, it's generally unwise to alter your own recipe without the help of a qualified professional. If you need to make notes to remind yourself of what you want changed, first make a copy of your legal document, then write in those margins and discuss what you want with your estate planning attorney.



School Smart

DShelley, My almost 17-year-old daughter wants to get an after-school job. While I think it's a good idea, I'm concerned about how it will

affect her school work. Do you have any suggestions about teenagers, school and working?

Work offers important self-esteem benefits to teens and some relief from the routine of school. It can help build a resume for future employment, and a regular paycheck can provide an important sense of empowerment as well as some life lessons about budgeting and taxes. Your daughter may also need to be aware that she might have to give up some things to make time for a job. And, school can easily get shortchanged in the process. Here are some things to consider and discuss with your daughter as she looks for a job. Studies show that work starts to take a toll on grades when teens spend more than 15 hours on the job each week. It may be wise for your child to work even fewer hours. A steady and predictable work schedule can make it far easier for your teen to manage time wisely. Employers know that high school students have academic commitments and will often make adjustments so that teens can work just on weekends, or perhaps two afternoons and a weekend day each week.

Talk with your daughter about how she sees her job and her schoolwork both getting done. What will she need to put off or give up in order to succeed at both the job and school? Organization is key to balancing schoolwork and jobs. Plan for homework and study times as well as work times and keep a highlighted, visible calendar in the kitchen as a reminder for her to study.

Make sure your daughter tells her teachers that she's taking a job. In most cases, school staff can be quite supportive of teens who are working and offer strategies for prioritizing schoolwork. They may be willing to share information about upcoming projects and due dates. Equally important, encourage your daughter to be open with her employer about her workload at school. If a boss isn't accommodating or flexible, your child may be better off finding work elsewhere.

Once your daughter begins working, check in frequently with her and find and ask how she's handling his job and schoolwork. It may also be wise to check in with her teachers to make sure all is well at school during this time of increased responsibilities and workload.

If your daughter starts showing signs of increased anxiety or depression or starts falling behind in school, act promptly. Talk to her immediately about what you're seeing, and discuss ways to help her get back on track. If you don't see prompt results, ask her to consider putting work aside for the time being. It may be that summertime, without the academic responsibilities, would be a better time for her to enter the working world. She would learn her job and then when school begins again, she would be more at ease with her work and be able to accomplish both school and work successfully.

Help fund a revocable living trust -Depending on your situation, you might want to establish a revocable living trust as part of your estate plans. A revocable living trust helps you avoid the time-consuming, expensive and public process of probate. And, among other benefits, a living trust allows you to distribute your financial assets over time, and in amounts that you specify – which may be quite appealing, if, for example, you'd rather not give your children a large amount of money at once. Life insurance can help fund your living trust - you just need to name the trustee (which may well be yourself while you're alive) as the owner and beneficiary of the policy. To avoid using up your financial assets - or, even worse, having to rely on your adult children for help - you may want to purchase insurance. Some life insurance plans offer long-term care coverage, either through a special "rider" or by accelerating your death benefit, but you might also want to consider a traditional long-term care insurance policy.

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Baseball's Color Barrier Broken But Much Remains To Be Accomplished

Whith the opening of baseball's Spring Training next week, it is proper and respectful to review how the face of America's pastime has changed since Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier 72 years ago.

We often wonder if the growing numbers of minority baseball players today, particularly Latino players, have any idea what the famous No. 42 meant to their careers. Robinson would have been 100 years old on January 13 of this

Robinson would have been 100 years old on January 13 of this year and unfortunately died at the young age of 53 just as players of color were beginning to rapidly fill Major League rosters. Major League Baseball will observe the 100th Anniversary of his birth

throughout the upcoming season.

There have been many, many books, movies and articles published about Robinson and, even if you're not a baseball fan, you owe it to yourself to read or see some of these movies or documents. Let's just look at some figures published two years ago by the Society for American Baseball Research. There are both positives and negatives in the report.

At the conclusion of the 1947 season, Robinson's first, white ballplayers made up 98.3 percent of Major League rosters, African Americans, 0.09 percent and Latino, 0.07. In 2016, the year the report was published, the percentage of white ballplayers had dropped to 63.7 percent, African American only 6.7 percent, Latino up to 27.4 percent and Asian at 2.1 percent.

What is alarming about the study is the precipitous drop in African American ballplayers beginning in the mid-1980s when they accounted for 18.8 percent.

Baseball has addressed this problem with a number of programs, particularly among inner city youth. The results have been far less than successful as the figures show.

There are many reasons why many talented, athletic African Americans have turned their backs on baseball in favor of basketball and football.

Undoubtedly, it's a matter of demographics and economics. The obstacles can be too few playing fields and the cost of equipment to play in traveling baseball leagues. The overall effect is that the pipeline feeding African Americans into the Major Leagues is even less populated than baseball itself.

A recent study by ESPN showed there are less than 5 percent of collegiate African

 Four times (2014, '15, '16 and '18). American baseball players. The road to riches obviously is much quicker in professional basketball and football where African Americans make up 80 percent of NBA rosters and nearly 70 percent in the NFL.

And African American athletes dominate these sports at the college level as well. We wonder how the courageous Robinson would view Major League baseball today? My guess he would be proud of the strides that have been made, but frustrated that the number of African American players in the game remains low.


Boston Manager To Attend Evening With The Red Sox



deaRPharmacist Supplements That Should Be Taken With Food

ear Readers: There is much confusion about when to take herbal supplements, vitamins and medications. Do you take them on an empty stomach or with food? No matter what

you take, you should be drinking a full glass of water to make sure the pill doesn't linger in your esophagus and cause irritation.

When a dietary supplement, enzyme or medication states the directive to "take with food," it usually means to take while your eating, or a few minutes beforehand. But since you have food in your gastrointestinal tract for a little while, it would be fine to take the item right after you eat. There's no right or wrong.

The following supplements should be taken with food:

Ashwagandha – This popular adaptogen should be thought of a little bit like 'food' because it is an herb. All herbs should be taken with a snack or a meal in order to amplify the benefits and reduce nausea

Multivitamins or pre-natal vitamins – There are so many constituents in these supplements, that it's best to take them with food in order to minimize stomach upset and nausea.

CoQ10 – Some people take this powerful antioxidant for cellular energy production to support their heart, pancreas, liver and brain. CoQ10 (ubiquinone) should be taken with food, or

Magnesium – Some people take magnesium for depression, regularity, reduction of leg cramps and blood pressure support. Like most minerals, taking magnesium with a snack can minimize diarrhea and stomach discomfort.

Vitamin D – You can take this without regard to meals, according to the newest research. However, most of the older scientific literature say to take it with food since it's fat-soluble.

Fish oil - Some people take fish oil to help with cholesterol, triglycerides, depression and blood joint health. Taking fish oil supplements (EPA, DHA or both) with food or fatty meals is ideal because it boosts the absorption.

The following medications should be taken with food:

Antacids - These help with heartburn or reflux. They should always be taken with food so that it can neutralize the acid that is secreted while you're eating.

Amoxicillin – The most popular antibiotic, especially for children. I recommend it be given to toddlers and teens with food in order to reduce indigestion, nausea and vomiting.

Čorticosteroids – These are used for pain, allergic reactions, rashes and overactive immune systems. These should always be taken with food or milk. Some examples include prednisone, hydrocortisone and dexamethasone.

Aspirin and ibuprofen - Ideally these are taken with food.

Metformin - Taken for diabetes, this medication is best taken around meal time in order to reduce blood sugar levels after eating.

Enzyme supplements or medications -Some people can't digest food normally, so they take enzyme supplements which break down the starch, fat and protein in a meal. Take these with meals. If a medication (i.e. Creon) is required to restore pancreatic function, it needs to be taken with meals.

MAT is an evidence-based treatment that uses medication to block the effects of opioids and helps users effectively maintain sobriety and recovery. MAT works by activating opioid receptors in the brain to provide relief from withdrawals and cravings without providing the euphoria that comes from using opioids.

To make the program possible, hospitalists and emergency department doctors have applied for and received waivers to administer and prescribe buprenorphine, an opioid-like medication used to treat opioid addiction.

To date, a handful of patients have entered into the pilot program which involves the following steps: 1) Treatment of the endocarditis

infection

2) Voluntary enrollment by patients with substance use disorder, including signing a patient code of conduct agreement

3) Patient begins MAT treatment with closely monitored doses of buprenorphine

4) Patients are seen weekly by the licensed clinical social worker from

Doctor and Dietician A Valentine For Your Heart

eart: The central or innermost part of something. In the human body, it pumps blood through the circulatory system. The emotional or moral nature of the heart is love and compassion. Both types of "heart" can be strengthened at any time - even as we

We spoke in an earlier article how love and generosity strengthen the heart, reduce stress and can help us live longer, more vibrant lives.

Let's look at the physical human heart - the hardest working muscle in the body. By the time many people are in their 50s, parts of the heart weaken and vessels stiffen, leading to increased blood pressure, making our hearts work harder, which can eventually lead to cardiac failure.

Research cardiologist Benjamin Levine, MD, of University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center and director of the Institute for Exercise and Environmental Medicine in Dallas, wanted to know if it was "too late" for those people who have been sedentary most of their adult lives to strengthen their hearts.

He took a group of sedentary middleaged adults and started them on an exercise program four or five times per week. The control group began stretching and balance work. One workout per

Brian Hummel, MD, a cardiothoracic surgeon at Lee Health's Shipley Cardiothoracic Center, convened an interdisciplinary team of caregivers to find a solution after seeing cases of endocarditis skyrocket. "I was alarmed by the number of patients returning to my care when they relapsed after trying standard addiction treatment. MAT has been proven to be the most effective treatment for opioid abuse, and we believe it will lead our patients to healthier lives," he said.

According to a report from the U.S.

week was a short but strenuous interval workout, while the other workouts were more moderate, like fast walks or jogs lasting 30-plus minutes. They continued this pattern for two years.

The results showed that by the end of two years the exercisers were more fit compared to the control group, with stronger and younger left ventricle heart muscles. Dr. Levine concluded his results suggest that our hearts can still change if we exercise. As they say in Chicago, vote early and often. 

Sweet Potato and Carrot Cupcakes

2 cups mashed sweet potato (1/2 cup separated)

1 carrot, grated

1 cup pecans, candied and crushed

1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon ground cardamom

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

1/8 teaspoon ground white pepper

1/8 teaspoon sea salt 1 cake mix, store bought or

homemade

Cream cheese frosting, store bought or homemade

Preheat oven to 375 degrees if using the homemade recipe (if using store bought, follow package instructions). Prepare cupcake batter using box mix or homemade recipe provided. Once the batter is prepared, place cupcake liners in the cupcake pan and set aside. In a small bowl combine the cinnamon, nutmeg, cardamom, ginger, white pepper, and sea salt and set aside. In another small

bowl combine $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of the mashed sweet potato and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the spice mixture. Fold this mixture along with the grated carrots into the cupcake batter until combined. Using an ice cream scoop, evenly divide the batter into the liners (about 2/3 full) do not overfill. Bake for about 16-18 minutes (if using the scratch made recipe) or until a toothpick comes out clean when inserted. Set aside to cool completely.

Meanwhile, fold in the remaining 1/2 cup sweet potato mixture into the cream cheese frosting. When the cupcakes are

completely cooled, frost each cupcake with desired amount of frosting. Sprinkle the crushed pecans and a small amount of the remaining spice mixture on each cupcake. Keep the cupcakes in a cool and dry area until ready to serve.
