



## Opening Night For Art Shows At Davis Center

The Sidney & Berne Davis Art Center will host two art exhibitions with an opening reception during Art Walk on Friday, September 2 from 6 to 10 p.m. Both exhibits will be on display through September 28.

A Place Beyond the Subconscious by Julio Figueroa Beltrán will be on display in the downstairs Grand Atrium, while an exhibit using projection mapping and art, titled Fractasia – Sacred Space in a Sacred Age by Israel Alpizar, will be featured upstairs in the Capital Gallery.


Beltrán attended Escuela Nacional de Bellas Artes San Alejandro and the Instituto Superior de Arte, both in Havana, prior to establishing himself in Miami. A Place Beyond the Subconscious underscores the importance of themes that are central to Surrealism, Freud or Jung, and are obvious influences on this artist's imaginative works. Wind turbines, highway overpasses and astronauts intersect with galleons, icebergs, jellyfish and tropical blooms. Forests and wooden

birdhouses meet military drones and theater stages. The mind dissolves causality and linear time to produce paintings that subordinate the passing issues of the day to the appetites of the archetype-driven imagination. With solo and group exhibitions in the U.S. and

Italy and works in prominent collections, Beltrán has secured a distinguished place in the art of his generation.

In Fractasia, Alpizar, who was born

in Mexico, utilizes a multi-sensory experience, diving into sacred geometry, psychedelia, surreal dream states and hyperconscious symbols with an '80s New Age twist. Fractasia is the fusion of two words: fractals and fantasia.

Fractals are infinitely complex proportional geometric shapes and patterns that repeat across different scales and dimensions of time and space. Fantasia, derived from the ancient Greek word phantasia, is imagery and imagination with a free flowing, no-strict-form musical composition. Using traditional painting techniques, contemporary projection mapping, lighting effects and interactive installations, Fractasia takes a peek at the imagination and how dreams and realities are one and the same.

Alpizar, who crossed the border at age 5 with his mother, will also be instructing a sacred geometry workshop on Saturday, September 17 and a wine and paint night on Wednesday, September 21. He will host a closing night masquerade party on Friday, September 30.

## Clowns Take Over The Bar At Alliance Theater

Theatre Conspiracy has opened its 29th anniversary season with *Clown Bar*, a hilarious play by Adam Szymkovic and directed by Bill Taylor. It's like no other play I've ever seen and I've seen a lot. Being a group of five, we got to the theater at 6:45 p.m. to make sure we could find accommodating seats. The entire theater is set as a bar scene where customers can order a drink at the

bar and mingle with most of the clowns. Everyone is given a red nose to wear, and the clowns mix with everyone, even taking photos.

You'll meet the male clowns. Giggles (Cicero McCarter) is a tough, no nonsense clown who works for Bobo and giggles just before shooting someone. Dusty (Scott Thomson) is an off-key crooner at the bar who's depressed because his cat died, and he has a secret side to him. Twinkles (Thomas Marsh) puts Dolly Parton to shame in certain departments. She also carries a gun. Shotgun (Grant Cothren) is another tough clown; a bartender, who carries a shotgun and isn't afraid to use it. Happy (Steven Coe) is a cop who used to be a clown. He wants to

find out who killed his brother Timmy, so he starts questioning everyone, especially his old girlfriend. Timmy (Declan Ireland) is Happy's younger brother who was killed, but shows up often in memory scenes. And last but not least, we meet Bobo (Rob Green), the tough owner of the bar and current boyfriend of Happy's ex-girlfriend. He is bigger than life and is not happy that Happy returned.

The female clowns are Blinkey (Kelly Rivadulla), the ex who wants to get back together with Happy. She does a

strip-tease number that is hysterical. Popo (Tera Nicole Miller) is a hit-woman clown who looks like Little Miss Muffett, but carries an ax that she has used before, judging from the blood on her outfit. Petunia (Shelly Sanders) is a fast-talking waitress on roller skates. Tweetsie (Lauren Drexler) and Curly (June Koc) also are part of the group.

The show moves quickly from one scene to another, and several clowns bite the dust in very comical ways. The show

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Historic Downtown Fort Myers, Then And Now:

# Best And Worst Of Times

Fort Myers native Rebecca Kinzie Holmes recalls her childhood as “the best of times for me to grow up in the worst of times worldwide.”

How to explain the seeming contradiction? Even when she was only 5 years old, she felt “very safe and free to roam.” But beyond that zone of safety and freedom loomed World War II.

At the center of that zone was the Jackson Street neighborhood where several of her relatives had homes.

And one place where she spent lots of time was the house pictured here, the home of her paternal grandparents, Capt. Andrew L. and Charlotte Eyber Kinzie.

It was located on the west side of Jackson Street, approximately midblock between Second Street and Anderson Avenue (today’s MLK, Jr. Boulevard).

Local builder WP Henley had constructed the seven-room wood-frame house for the Kinzies in 1910. It featured high ceilings, a wrap-around porch, and a captain’s walk outside one of the three upstairs bedrooms.

Holmes’ memories of the yard show just how rural downtown could be, even into the mid-20th century.

The house’s water supply came from a large wooden cistern. There were also chickens in the yard, who had to worry about her grandmother grabbing and wringing their necks when it was time to prepare dinner.

There was plenty else to entertain her, including checkers, cards and games with her grandfather.

Her great-grandmother, Clara Eyber, also lived in the house, as did her Aunt Charlotte (White) sometimes, both her “favorites.”

Great-grandmother Eyber, a dressmaker, was a woman of many talents and made Rebecca many “adorable outfits.” She also taught her how to roller skate and ride a bike.

Dubbing herself Santa’s Helper, she made Christmas wonderful for everyone, her great-granddaughter remembers.

Little adventures abounded in the neighborhood, such as going across the street to the

soda fountain at the St. Charles Hotel, where she enjoyed her first milkshake and sundae. Besides being a wonderful grandfather, Capt. Kinzie had other claims to fame in local history.

He was one of the three legendary Kinzie brothers – George F., Andrew L. and Eric W.– who came to Fort Myers on Easter Sunday, 1887, accompanied by their mother, Ernestine.

Their father, Rheinhold, had already arrived from their native Germany and homesteaded in Olga in 1880. However, he died in 1887 after his family’s arrival.

Andrew was about 12 years old upon his arrival. He attended Fort Myers public schools, earned a teaching certificate, as did his brothers, and taught for several terms.

He became a U.S. citizen in 1899, and for a time, worked for the Plant steamer line. In 1904, the brothers formed the Kinzie Brothers Steamship Line, which plied the Caloosahatchee and connected the barrier islands, delivering mail and produce.

In 1918, Eric sold his interest in the steamship line to his two brothers and bought land east of downtown (near Second and Michigan streets), eventually establishing the famous Kinzie’s Rose Garden.

In 1928, Andrew and George founded the ferry service between Punta Rassa and Sanibel, which ran until 1963, when the bridge to Sanibel was built.

The captain also took a keen interest in civic affairs, serving five two-year terms on the Fort Myers town council as well as positions in local organizations.

He died in 1949.

Charlotte Kinzie completed 50 years of residence in the home before it was demolished in 1961. She died in 1974.

A law firm is now located on the site of a home so well remembered by a granddaughter.

Take a stroll to Jackson Street and imagine when the block had family homes with big inviting porches and a hotel soda fountain to escape to. Then visit the following two research centers to learn more about early families of Fort Myers.

# Local Theater Educator Attends Famed Program

**D**ana Alvarez, director of theater education at Cape Coral's new Belle Theatre, was one of just six theater educators from around the world who was invited to take part in the 11th annual Freddie G Fellowship in New York City recently.

The Freddie G Fellowship honors instructors and teachers who are working to make a difference for their students and communities through the process of staging musical theater productions in their schools and educational theater groups. The four-day theater intensive workshop is underwritten by Freddie ("G") Gershon and his wife, Myrna. Among his many accolades, Gershon helped bring *La Cage aux Folles*, *Evita*, *Saturday Night Fever* and *Grease* to Broadway.

Alvarez could not have been more thrilled to be chosen as a Freddie G. "The Freddie Gershon teaching fellowship is a really special privilege. It is a complete honor," she said.

Two factors proved instrumental in

her selection for the fellowship. First and foremost is her overall body of work.

"I have been involved with teaching children and with theater since I was a teenager," said Alvarez. "I began a program at Oasis Elementary that's still going to this day without me being there. At Melody Lane, we started up a theater program there when the performing arts center was brand new. So, those sorts of things, I suppose, are noteworthy."

As an elementary school teacher, Alvarez twice received Teacher of the Year honors. She's directed more than 35 major musicals, including three Disney pilot productions, and has performed as a principal in *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*, *Little Shop of Horrors*, *Seussical*, *Music Man* and *Jekyll*

& *Hyde*.

While musical theater is her forte today, Alvarez is no stranger to the Bard. In high school, she represented Southwest Florida in the International Shakespeare Competition, performing at Lincoln Center.

However, it was a group of young performers she took to the Junior Theatre Festival (JTF) in Atlanta in 2019 who were responsible for helping Alvarez appear on the Freddie G selection panel's radar. Out of 133 groups who performed at JTF Atlanta in 2019, Alvarez's students were one of only eight that earned a coveted Outstanding Production Award.

"I think when your team receives that kind of exceptional recognition, and they were chosen to perform on the main stage in front of 6,500 people to show one of their numbers – we had brought *Lion King* that year, and it was so inspiring – that that sort of thing puts you on the map, at least, and has something tangible to back up what it is that you've been doing for years."

Alvarez returned to JTF Atlanta in January 2020, a mere matter of weeks before COVID shut down Broadway and shuttered theater companies around the world. While there, she decided to throw her hat in the Freddie G ring and, to her surprise and that of the young performance team she was shepherding, was chosen for the fellowship.

In New York, the teacher became the student, with Alvarez taking part in three full days – from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. – of workshops and developmental programs.

She not only received tips, technical advice and mentorship from Broadway professionals and theater greats, she received one-on-one feedback from Tony honor-winning *Newsies* director and choreographer Jeff Calhoun.

"He was actually tasked to watch us Freddie G teachers direct a scene for a half an hour and then give us feedback on our own direction and offer suggestions and encouragement. It was terrifying," said Alvarez. "It was just very validating and inspiring to have that kind of interaction with a director."

Her three biggest takeaways from her

four-day Freddie G experience involve auditions, warm-ups and the way she directs. The changes are designed to make young performers feel more comfortable, less anxious and more integrated into the creative process.

For example, gone are the old days of one-by-one auditions. Going forward, Belle Theatre auditions will resemble *A Chorus Line*.

"We've started instituting doing things in more group settings where you teach small pieces of music and have everyone sing it together and have them in small groups, then do it one by one. You would think singing in front of other students would be more nerve-wracking, but it actually makes it less scary because they're all in the same boat and they've had so much repetition with it that they're just sitting there like, 'Okay, now it's my turn to do that,'" Alvarez said.

The biggest change is a profound and fundamental shift in the way she directs a show.

"I really love the idea of having main pictures, main points in each scene that you want to be able to create, but giving the students that main point and seeing what they do with it, what kind of a picture they create, what kind of a tableau is that really getting across and letting things happen organically as opposed to just line by line telling them what to do. So, definitely a more hands-on interactive type of theater experience that involves the kids as part of the team," she said.

Alvarez is excited to not only use her experiences and network of new contacts to make her young performers the best they can be, but to share the tips and skills she learned in New York with others as a Freddie G peer-to-peer guiding light.



# Florida Peperomia

**Plant Smart**

Florida peperomia (*Peperomia obtusifolia*) is an attractive evergreen groundcover endemic to Florida and listed as endangered in the state. That status means that it is “in imminent danger of extinction” and “is unlikely if the causes of a decline in the number of plants continue,” according to the state’s official definition.

It is also found in Mexico, the West Indies, Central America and northern South America.

Other common names are baby rubberplant and ovalleaf or broadleaf peperomia.

In the wild, it’s found in swamps and hammocks, where it might be recumbent or climbing like a vine, terrestrial or epiphytic – an air plant.

Although it will tolerate nutrient-poor soil, it needs organic material to survive, so it often grows in humusy areas or on rotting logs. While it loves moisture and humidity, it needs organic well-drained soil to avoid rot.

For the home landscape, it’s recommended for natural gardens,

especially in shade. However, avoid planting it in areas where people or pets walk, for the brittle stems will be broken.

It makes a pretty container plant with trailing stems or in a cascade down a wall. The dark green succulent leaves are glossy and measure two to six inches long with rounded or notched leaf tips.

Leaves alternate on creeping stems of up to two feet long. Their shape is some variation of oval or spatulate with fairly long petioles, or leaf stalks.

Very slender erect flower spikes appear at the stem end. About five inches long, they are dense with minute green or white flowers which mature to brown.

The plant blooms throughout the year, most profusely in summer. It spreads via rhizomes, forming clumps, rooting at the nodes and reaching six to nine inches tall.

This herb is long-lived and has a moderate growth rate. It has low tolerance for salty or brackish conditions or for drought.

Gardeners are advised to seek specimens from local, not tropical American, stock. Propagate it with cuttings or by division.

It produces a tiny brown inconspicuous hooked fruit that enables it to climb on

tree bark.

The plant has traditional medicinal and culinary uses. Variegated specimens also exist.

## Gulf Grouper Season To Close

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is closing the recreational harvest of red grouper in state waters of the Gulf of Mexico, excluding waters of Monroe County, on Tuesday, August 30 for the remainder of the 2022 fishing season. Harvest will reopen on January 1, 2023.

This closure is consistent with the closure in federal waters of the Gulf of Mexico by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration’s National Marine Fisheries Service. The recreational red grouper fishery was closed in federal waters because landings information indicates that the 2022 recreational quota is projected to be met on August 29. Red grouper is primarily a Florida fishery and consistent open/closed seasons in state and federal waters off Florida is important to prevent overfishing and continue to improve stock abundance.

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
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# Loving The Lack Of Boat Pressure

With very few anglers out on the water, it's been a joy to have what seems like almost the entire bay to yourself. This lack of boat pressure always happens this time of year once

the kids return back to school. Besides Labor Day weekend, it will be much of the same all the way until October. Pulling up into the usually congested passes or to your favorite bait spot and being the only boat there is as good as it gets.

This past week, I've started returning to the mangrove bays and creeks of the JN "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge that I usually don't start fishing until fall. I have had great success catching a amazing variety of species both against the mangroves and out in the channels. Usually, these creeks don't fire off until the water begins to cool off, though as our days are getting noticeably shorter, it's apparently enough to push fish back into these places.

The best tide for me in these sheltered bays and creek systems has been during the last few hours of a strong outgoing tide. Catching your entire slam at one stop has been pretty common along with a few other surprise species. Target the deeper

points that have strong tide movement to catch snook, mangrove snapper and an occasional redfish. Expect trout, jacks and ladyfish out in the open-water channels. Chumming live shiners will fire off these fish, land the cast at the pop, and you will

quickly get bit.

Although temperatures don't feel like fall is close at hand, the massive schools of Spanish mackerel around the causeway bridges are a sure sign it's coming. As you watch these mackerel explode on

the surface as they gorge on fry bait, you will see a tarpon roll in the mix once in a while. The C Span seems to be holding the most life of any of the bridges with feeding birds and breaking fish there just about every tide phase. Soaking cut baits on the bottom or drifting a large pinfish under a float will give you a good shot at one of these tarpon.

Tripletail have also started to show up in the sound, though most of these fish are on the small side of the 18-inch minimum. Just about any crab pot, marker, no-wake buoy or weed line is a good place to look for these fish up on the surface. Whenever you're traveling from spot to spot, always keep your eyes open as you can run across one almost anywhere. Deeper water closer to the intracoastal seems to be best.

# Burrowing Owl

The burrowing owl (*Athene cunicularia*) is a small, land-loving owl that can be found in grasslands, ranges, deserts and agricultural areas in both North America and South America. These brown, well-

camouflaged birds have become rare in many areas due to loss of habitat.

At CROW, an adult burrowing owl was admitted from Cape Coral after being stuck in a glue trap. Veterinarians noted the owl's primary and secondary wing feathers were covered in glue residue, and the owl was missing some rectrices, which are tail feathers used in flight for steering.

"This burrowing owl was lucky! It is common to see large wounds or even broken bones associated with being stuck in a glue trap but, in this case, x-rays were totally normal and aside from feather damage, there were no large wounds," said Dr. Melanie Pearson, CROW veterinary medicine intern.

The glue was removed using the oils from chinchilla dust, a dish soap/water mixture, unused mascara wands and natural peanut butter.

"Our fabulous vet staff actually reached out to the glue trap manufacturers,

and peanut butter was one of their recommendations for glue removal. The oil in the peanut butter helps to remove the glue," said Dr. Pearson. "You can work the chinchilla dust into the feathers for a similar effect. The chinchilla dust is also great for getting the feathers off of the glue trap itself, because it coats the trap so the feathers don't get re-stuck. Finally, a Dawn (dish soap) bath is used at the end to get all the oil and dust off.

"There are many methods to help get all of the glue off, and yes, creativity is definitely key. Patience is also a big component as the de-gluing takes a while.

It is usually performed under general anesthesia to decrease patient stress."

The patient's tail wings are expected to grow back.

"We estimated the owl was missing five of 10 rectrices. They can start to regrow by three to four weeks, but they take at least two months to grow back completely."

After the glue was removed, the owl was moved to CROW's outdoor burrowing owl enclosure to continue rehabilitation and begin flight conditioning.

"The patient will be assessed for

release on a weekly basis. Burrowing owls need to be able to fly low to the ground, swoop quickly and catch fast-moving rodent prey," said Dr. Pearson. "Once we are confident the patient has this full flight capability, we will schedule a release date."

Glue traps are considered a cruel method of trapping, especially for animals or birds that wander into them.

"Glue traps are common because they do their job of catching animals very well. They are extremely effective, however, users do not often realize how the traps work," said Dr. Pearson. "At CROW, we consider them to be inhumane methods of pest control. They trap the animal in place, which causes significant emotional distress as well as destruction of delicate body parts. Feathers and fur can become torn and tattered, and these small animals can be struggling to get out and break bones or get large wounds.

"Additionally, they trap anything that comes across them, not just so-called 'pests,' so animals that are not intended frequently become trapped. There are far more humane methods of pest control that can be utilized without causing the degree of destruction that is risked with a glue trap."

## United Way Seeks Volunteers For Tax Season

United Way of Lee, Hendry, and Glades is seeking volunteers for the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program during the 2023 tax season. Volunteer tax preparers, greeters and bilingual-Spanish speaking interpreters are needed to provide no-cost tax preparation services at over 20 locations throughout Southwest Florida for individuals and families earning less than \$66,000 per year.

Volunteer tax preparers will receive IRS certified training including learning how to prepare basic tax returns, using online tax preparation software and learning about tax credits and deductions that benefit eligible taxpayers. Volunteers of all ages and levels of experience are welcome, though it is preferred that volunteer tax preparers be comfortable working with a computer. Experienced agents, certified financial planners and non-credentialed tax return preparers can earn continuing education credits when volunteering as a VITA tax preparer.

The amount of federal refunds generated by United Way's VITA program in Lee, Hendry, Glades and Charlotte counties last season was over \$10.8 million and, by providing no-cost tax preparation, the 170 certified volunteers were able to assist over 6,800 VITA clients this past tax season, saving them over \$2.1 million in tax preparation fees by a commercial service.

The program runs on volunteer power – volunteers who like working with people and who want to help improve the quality of life for people in the community. The service is for people who often cannot afford to pay someone to file their tax returns and do not feel comfortable or inclined to file their own. No experience is necessary.

"The help we provide the community is priceless" said Carolyn Peplow, a VITA volunteer for the past five years. "Volunteering is easy, and you can do as much as you feel comfortable with."

Flexible hours are available January through April every tax season. Online orientations and training classes for new volunteers begin in November. Small, in-person classes will be available as well. For tax professionals or experienced volunteers, an online training and certification tool is also available. 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## Book Review

# The Change

by Di Saggau



I found *The Change* by Kirsten Miller to be a rare treat. It's a suspenseful story with great pacing and memorable characters, a fierce and funny novel focused on three middle-aged

women in a New York town who develop supernatural abilities during menopause, which they use to avenge murdered teenage girls in the New York beach town of Mattuck.

When Nessa James' husband dies and her twin daughters leave for college, she's all alone in a small white house near the ocean. In her late 40s, the former nurse starts to hear voices, voices calling out to her from the dead. It's a gift she's inherited from her grandmother, but it comes with special responsibilities.

Advertising director Harriett Osborne is approaching 50 and has witnessed the demise of her lucrative career and her marriage. She has been house-bound for months and her garden appears to have gone wild, but the truth is, she's undergone a stunning and very welcome metamorphosis.

Jo Levison, a former executive, has spent 30 long years at war with her



body. The hot flashes that arrive with the beginning of menopause are almost the last straw until she learns to channel them, and finally figures out her power.

The three women are guided by voices only Nessa can hear. They discover a teenage girl whose body was abandoned beside a remote beach. The police write the victim off as a drug-addicted sex worker, but the women don't buy it and lead their own investigation into the case. They discover more bodies and an

exclusive group of the town's wealthiest men, who don't go by the rules.

Miller does a brilliant job weaving the three women's lives together. They plot their revenge against the patriarchy and

come into their own when society has deemed them no longer useful. It is sweet revenge, and makes for a book you won't want to put down.\*

## School Smart

**D**ear Shelley, Anxiety

in children of all ages is a real concern. With the onset of the school year, schoolwork, homework,

reduction of free time and new routines, it's easy for children to experience increased anxiety. Anxiety is easier to spot with 'tweens and teens and they may in fact be willing to discuss their anxious feelings with you. However, with younger children, anxiety can show up as several alternate behaviors. Here are some of the most common behaviors you may see in children who are anxious.

Anger – Anxiety can occur when there is an overestimation of a perceived threat (e.g., a test or a party) and an underestimation of coping skills (e.g., "I can't handle this"). When kids are chronically and excessively worried and don't feel like they have the skills to manage the anxiety, they feel helpless. Helplessness leads to frustration, which can show up as anger.

Difficulty Sleeping – In children, having difficulty falling asleep or staying asleep is one of the hallmark characteristics of anxiety. In many kids, trains of anxious thoughts keep them awake long after they should be asleep. Others have anxiety about falling asleep, thinking they will miss their alarm or be tired in the morning.

Defiance – Unable to communicate what is really going on, it is easy to interpret the child's defiance as a lack of discipline instead of an attempt to control a situation where they feel anxious and helpless. Lack of Focus – Children with anxiety are often so caught up in their own thoughts that they do not pay attention to what is going on around them. This is especially troublesome at school where they are expected to pay attention to a teacher for hours at a time.

Chandeliering – Chandeliering is when a seemingly calm person suddenly flies off the handle for no reason. They have pushed hurt and anxiety so deep for so long that a seemingly innocent comment or event suddenly sends them straight through the chandelier, so to speak. Children with anxiety are often so caught up in their own thoughts that they do not pay attention to what is going on around them.

Overplanning – Overplanning and defiance go hand in hand in their root

cause. Where anxiety can cause some children to try to take back control through defiant behavior, it can cause others to overplan for situations where planning is minimal or unnecessary. Preparing for every possibility is a way a child with anxiety takes control of an uncontrollable situation.

Anxious children need to learn how to deal with their anxiety (so do adults). There are a number of skills and strategies that they can be taught. School personnel might be able to help as could the child's physician. There are a number of home-based parent programs that are also helpful.





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## Meaningful Last Words

“Harry” complained to me recently while reading over his estate planning documents. “These seem so...cold...so... ‘legal,’” he said slowly, searching for the right words. “I understand that these documents have to use this legal language so that my estate gets the benefits of the law, but I’m having a hard time knowing that these will be my last words that I communicate to my family.”

I understood Harry completely. Who wants their last words to read, “I instruct my trustee to distribute a fraction of my estate, the numerator of which is comprised of the largest amount that would

not be taxable... blah blah blah?”

I am sure that no one wants that.

Today, I’m going to propose that you consider an alternative. This alternative can be made into a very meaningful and fun exercise.

What I’m referring to is to leave a separate letter – apart from your will – for each of your most important loved ones.

This letter shouldn’t be about “who gets what” from your estate – that’s for your will and trust. Besides, you don’t want to inadvertently say anything that might contradict what’s in your legal documents that could lead to beneficiary disputes.

Instead, what I’m talking about here, is for you to create something really special. Too often we don’t share our true emotions with those closest to us. We often tell our spouses that we love them, but we don’t tell them why we love them. We might tell our children that we are proud of them, but we don’t tell them why we are proud of them. We may truly admire something about a lifelong friend, but we are often afraid to open up and tell them what we’ve admired about them, or even that we harbored admiration to begin with.

How great would it be if we shared all of those thoughts with those closest to us? So, I propose that you do just that. Write a letter and tell our loved ones how much they’ve meant to us. Then have that letter kept with your will, to be opened concurrently.

I thought that I’d suggest a few basic thoughts for those who might not be as comfortable putting words on paper:

**Keep it Positive** – Particularly when you are writing a letter that you don’t intend for a loved one to receive until after you have departed this earth, it’s a good idea to keep it positive. Everyone is subject to valid criticisms for our faults and unfulfilled expectations. Don’t use this letter as a means to review those. These are your last words. Don’t you want them to leave them with a smile? But do be sincere. Don’t heap praise where praise really isn’t believable. Everyone has positive qualities. Talk about those here.

**Write Separate Letters** – Don’t combine everything into one letter. Write one for your spouse. Another to each child or other loved one. That way your letter can be very

personal for that particular person.

**Open a Spousal Letter with How You Fell in Love** – You might open a letter to your spouse recalling the first time that you met, and how you knew that you were in love. Talk about the qualities that she or he possessed and how those qualities grew better over time.

**Recall Your Child’s Early Years** – For your children, you might open a letter about their early years – how much you cherished having them in your life. There may have been certain traits, characteristics or events that foreshadowed later successes they achieved. Talk about those and how you noticed them.

**Tell Them Why** – Don’t be shy telling your loved ones the “whys.” Why you are so in love. Why you are so proud. Why you smile when you think about them. With kids, it might even be fun to tell them why you wanted to have kids in the first place, and how different it was raising them as opposed to what you expected before you ever had kids.

**Review Fun Family Times or Accomplishments** – Every relationship has its ups and downs. Many of the ups can be chronicled as happening during a certain event; a vacation, a sporting event, a holiday gathering. While everyone might have already grown tired of hearing the same stories around the dinner table over and over, you might be able to provide a twist and relay why that story meant so much to you, and how it demonstrates your loved one’s special qualities.

**Regrets** – Generally speaking, it’s not a good idea to create a list of regrets. But you might have some that would have a positive spin. “I regret that I didn’t tell you this earlier, and hope that by telling you this now, you’ll know how much you meant to me,” for example. You may regret certain incidents and want to apologize for them. If this is the case, do your best to keep it concise while not trying to place blame or guilt on your loved one.

**Your Hopes and Dreams** – Talk about your hopes and dreams for your loved one, particularly if they are young. If they aren’t young anymore, you can talk about how proud you are of their accomplishments. Maybe they’ve raised great kids of their own. Perhaps they’ve overcome a lot of obstacles and you’ve noticed how far they’ve come. That’s great stuff. Let them know it.

**Wind it Up** – Make sure that you leave them with a warm statement. I saw one letter where a father told each of his children that he wanted them to know that he believed in an afterlife, and although his children may no longer be able to touch him or hear him, they could talk to him and he would be there to listen. He told them that he trusted their judgment, and he hoped that they would live the rest of their life with confidence that everything happens for a reason. It struck me as a powerful confirmation of his love, devotion and admiration.

I hope that this column helped provide the start of an outline if you should feel this important to do for your loved ones. I’m working on a letter for my wife and for each of my children, which I intend to update as the years go by. I’m hopeful that these writings will mean more to them than anything material that I leave behind.

“The RedSnook Catch and Release Charity Tournament is an absolute vital source of funding, engagement and involvement to help the Conservancy solve water quality problems in our region,” said Rob Moher, president and CEO of the Conservancy. “Through the years, the RedSnook tournament has brought more than \$1.5 million that directly funds our water quality efforts both in advocacy locally and in Tallahassee and Washington, DC, and also our scientific research and education programs, which help us understand the impacts of different nutrients on our water resources.”

The schedule includes:

Kick-off Party – October 21 at 5:30 p.m. at Florida Sports Park.

Tournament – October 22 and 23, launch time of 7 a.m., lines in the water at 7:30 a.m. and return to the launch site at 3:30 p.m. each day.

Awards Ceremony – October 23 at 5:30 p.m. at the Conservancy of Southwest Florida; sponsored by Northern Trust.

“Our beaches and waters are a generational resource, so it's really crucial to raise awareness of the fragility

of that resource to ensure that future generations can continue to enjoy it,” said Jessica Fontana, tournament committee member.

Through the years, the funds raised at the RedSnook Catch and Release Charity Tournament have helped support the conservancy's water quality work in several ways, including:

Providing assistance and expertise to water quality projects at the local, state and federal level;

Creating the “Estuaries Report Card,” which rates the condition of the region's vital waters;

Working to limit the amount of pollution from the north that enters Southwest Florida's water;

Researching and monitoring juvenile gamefish habitats;

Helping to restore the western Everglades and Ten Thousand Islands; and

Working to protect Ten Thousand Islands, Big Cypress, Estero Bay, the Cocohatchee Slough and the Caloosahatchee.

“There are a lot of great, fun tournaments around, but this is one of the few that everyone should care about because it's all about the water,” said Wayne Meland, tournament co-chair. “Whether you fish or not, to be involved with the RedSnook Tournament is important, because water is the key to why everyone loves living here.”

## What Is The Hauser Diet?

**W**e encourage you to eat fresh, real foods and avoid sugar and chemicals that come with processed foods. When you hear the word “diet,” you might think of diets you have tried to become “healthy” and how restricted your eating became to lose weight. But that is not what a diet is.

A diet is just the kind of food that a person eats. Did you know that based on your individual physiology, you require different types of food? Did you ever wonder why some people appear to have fast metabolisms, enabling them to eat everything and never gain weight, whereas others’ metabolisms are so slow that they

eat like birds and never lose weight?

The Hauser Diet is an alternative approach to healthy eating. We all know that our bodies are not the same, our fingerprints are not the same, and thus our physiology and diet requirements should not be looked at as one size fits all.

First, think about how you feel while eating food. Do you feel energized with pasta and veggies or do you feel better eating meat? Can you drink coffee any time and not be wired or will it keep you awake? Are you typically hotter than most people or colder? These are the types of questions we ask to help ascertain what type of diet is best for your physiology.

The Hauser Diet Quiz is available on [www.hauserdiet.com](http://www.hauserdiet.com) to help determine diet type. Some people don’t really know how to answer the questions as they relate to how certain foods make them feel after consuming them as opposed to if they like consuming them.

The Hauser Diet is made up of five different diet types: Lions, Otters, Bears, Monkeys and Giraffes. All types need to include proteins, fats and carbs in their daily eating plans, however, what differs within each diet type is the quantity of proteins, fats, and carbs.

The Hauser Diet types:

Lion Diet type – 60 percent protein/25 percent fat/15 percent carbs;

Otter Diet type – 50 percent protein/25 percent fat/25 percent carbs;

Bear Diet type – 50 percent protein/fat and 50 percent carbs;

Monkey Diet type – 35 percent protein/fat and 65 percent carbs; and

Giraffe Diet type – 20 percent protein/fat and 80 percent carbs.

We know that starting a new diet may be intimidating, as it is challenging to break long-standing, unhealthy habits, but realize your future life depends on feeding your body optimally. We encourage you to take the first step, which is to start shopping the perimeter of the grocery store and purchasing fresh food versus processed foods in boxes or cans. Work on reducing soda and/or sugar intake. Take small steps and work your way to providing your body with better fuels.

What foods are high in protein? Meat or animal proteins such as beef, pork, lamb, chicken, turkey, fish, eggs and dairy products are the foods that contain the most protein, and Lion/Otter Diet types should eat more of it. Monkey and Giraffe Diet types should be consuming vegetarian sources of protein including foods like lentils, nuts, chia seeds, tofu and chickpeas, along with lots of fresh vegetables.

When talking about fat, we do not mean eating a fast food burger and fries, we are talking about healthy fats, like avocados, EVOO, nuts and seeds, and full-fat dairy products. Good fats have beneficial effects on health and have been shown to help improve heart health, boost brain function and enhance nutrient absorption.

You need to be careful of the carbs you are eating because they may cause high

blood sugar and produce stored fat and cholesterol. However, good carbohydrates can come in the form of whole grains like quinoa, brown rice, oats and whole-grain pasta. Of course, vegetables are loaded with “good carbs!” Yes – leafy greens, spinach, tomatoes, broccoli, cauliflower, green beans and others provide your body with carbohydrates, as well as smaller amounts of protein.

Fruits, on the other hand, are 100 percent carbs. Thus, those following a more protein/fat-based diet such as the Lion or Otter Diet types should minimize their intake of fruit. And finally, sugar, sugary foods, as well as baked goods typically contain flour and sugar that are also carbohydrates but are less nutritionally dense. Thus, intake of these types of foods should be limited by everyone.

## Pickle Juice Has Health Benefits

**Dear Readers:** Hear me out, I know it sounds weird, but pickle juice has some pretty amazing and surprising health benefits that you probably didn’t

even know about. Pickles are fermented cucumbers (that have been pickled in salt water). Get it? The pickles are pickled! (A little pickle pun never hurt anyone!)

The fact is, pickle juice is loaded with minerals, only 2 carbs, and 1 gram of fiber. In most cases, the water even contains healthy probiotic strains. In some states, like North Carolina where my daughter lives, pickle juice is held in high regard. So much so, that there is an annual pickle festival! When dining out in North Carolina, many restaurants have pickle juice mixed with soda on the menu. There’s a drink called a Pickleback Shot, which combines pickle brine with whiskey!

There are all kinds of specialty drinks depending on where you live. So, while it may sound like a face-puckering thought, pickle juice is utilized for many quick fixes. As for its medicinal benefits, here are three pretty cool ways pickle juice can improve your wellness:

**Pickles Help Digestion** – On some level, the lactobacillus content (while low) still

provides a beneficial aid to your intestinal health. If you have an upset stomach, abdominal cramps or low stomach acid production (hypochlorhydria), the acidity of a small amount of pickle juice may restore proper pH, which in turn causes digestive troubles to subside.

**Pickles Help Leg Cramps** – Have a cramp? Pickle juice is a popular folk remedy that supposedly relieves muscle cramps (or reduces intensity), in under a minute of consumption! Like, almost immediately! It works incredibly fast and is faster than water alone when it comes to reducing muscle cramps. It probably works faster than things like Gatorade or other similar sports drinks.

Some suggest pickle juice for the morning after a night of drinking... I don’t know about that one, but I do think it could definitely help you recover from a workout or associated leg cramps. That’s probably its No. 1 folk remedy use.

Perhaps a few spoonfuls in a cup of water could help someone with mild leg cramps but I wouldn’t drink it straight up if you are prone to heartburn or have an ulcer. Pickle juice contains a lot of sodium, and some believe that it triggers reflexes that essentially shut off misfiring neurons quickly, thereby alleviating cramps.

We all probably have a dusty, sealed jar of old pickles that we’ve forgotten about, and if you’re like me, it’s probably sitting in the back corner of our fridge waiting for a sandwich! Make sure yours are fresh and in date, and if you eat these little guys, eat them in moderation because of the high sodium content. If you don’t like the taste of pickle juice straight up, you could pour a few teaspoonfuls into your salad dressing.

**Chicken and Vegetable Fried Rice**

- 2 (8 ounce) chicken breasts
  - 1 bell pepper (any color)
  - 1 cup cabbage, sliced thin
  - 2 carrots, sliced thin
  - 6 mushrooms, sliced thin
  - 2 cups spinach
  - 2 eggs
  - 3 cups cooked rice (brown or white)
  - 2 green onions, sliced thin
  - 2 garlic cloves, minced
  - 2-3 tablespoons low sodium soy sauce or Tamari
  - 1 teaspoon toasted sesame oil
  - 3-4 tablespoons olive oil, for cooking
  - Chili sauce or sriracha (optional)
  - Sea salt and fresh ground pepper, to taste
- Cook rice according to package directions and set aside. Dice the chicken

breasts into 1-inch pieces and store in the refrigerator until ready to cook. Prepare and slice all the vegetables and set aside. Mix soy sauce, sesame oil and garlic and set aside. Preheat a large sauté pan over medium-high heat and add 1 tablespoon of olive oil. Beat two eggs and scramble, set aside. Next, season the diced chicken with salt and pepper and sauté for six minutes or until cooked thoroughly. Remove from pan and set aside. Add another tablespoon of olive oil to the pan and sauté the carrots for one to two minutes. Add the bell peppers and cabbage, season with salt and pepper and cook for additional two minutes. Remove the vegetables and set aside. Using the same pan, add a small amount of olive oil and sauté the mushrooms, green onions and spinach. Add this to the rest of the cooked chicken and vegetables. Lastly, add 1 tablespoon of olive oil to the hot pan and stir-fry the rice until it is slightly crisp, add the scrambled eggs and combine. Pour the soy sauce mixture and stir to combine. Serve chicken and vegetables over fried rice in large bowl.\*

Students should keep a close eye on deadlines when applying for student financial aid, according to KHEEA.

As students make their plans for beginning or continuing their postsecondary education, they should try to get all the financial aid they can. To make sure they do so, they need to apply for that aid on a timely basis. Every scholarship or grant they receive will reduce their dependence on student loans.

Here are some helpful student financial aid tips from KHEEA:

File the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible beginning October 1. You must submit the FAFSA to qualify for most state and federal student aid.

Check with the financial aid offices of the schools to which you've applied to determine if they require any forms other than the FAFSA.

Look for scholarships using a free online scholarship search.

Attend any college fairs and financial aid seminars offered in your area. If a company charges a fee for helping with applications, remember that you can do that yourself for free. If you decide to pay for help, make sure the company is reputable by checking with the attorney general's office or the Better Business Bureau in your area, as well as the area where the firm is located.

KHEEA is a public, nonprofit agency established in 1966 to improve students' access to college. It provides information

about financial aid and financial literacy at no cost to students and parents.




